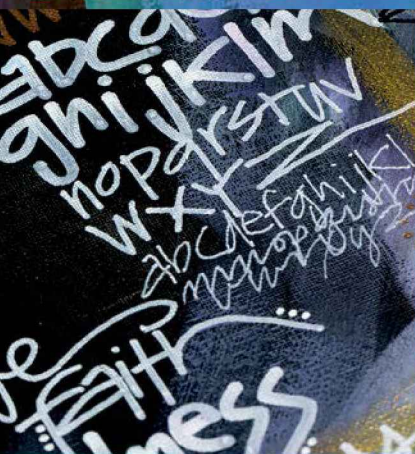

# INTRODUCTION

## FINDING YOUR INNER FONT

*Do you want to know the secret to creating whimsical lettering? As Glinda the Good Witch from *The Wizard of Oz* said, "You've always had the power." That power originated as a child when you were taught to write with pencil and paper.*

Look at your own writing and you'll see that it has a distinct look; it shows your personality. Your handwriting is your identity; it is as much a part of who you are as your voice, your laugh, and your walk. It's how you show yourself to the world and how you respond to the universe in visual form. Combined with various creative techniques, your handwriting can be transformed and designed into a distinct style that is recognized as clearly your own.

When you begin to learn how to define your own lettering style, remember that this is a craft that takes time and practice. Think of this experience as your first piano lessons. You might not be playing a piece by Mozart immediately,

but rather mastering the notes and movement of "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star," taking baby steps on the journey to your personal perfection. When you're learning an instrument, it's important to practice every day. It's the same when learning hand lettering, in that you're only going to get really good at it by practicing the same letters over and over and over. Practice really does make perfect, and it's important that you embrace your own personal perfection. While you're making efforts to learn a lettering style, my best advice is to embrace your work as being "perfectly imperfect." Know that each brave attempt in any stage of a creative learning process is a perfect result in your learning curve.

My philosophy on artful lettering is to empower you and give you confidence in your own handwriting. It's sometimes more frustrating to copy a style or alphabet because it never ends up looking like the sample you're trying to imitate. While copying and reproducing an art style is perfectly fine, it's important to dig deep in your own abilities and stretch yourself to develop your own creative identity. If your artwork is hanging on a wall, your style should be recognized from across a room, with an aesthetic that reflects who you are.

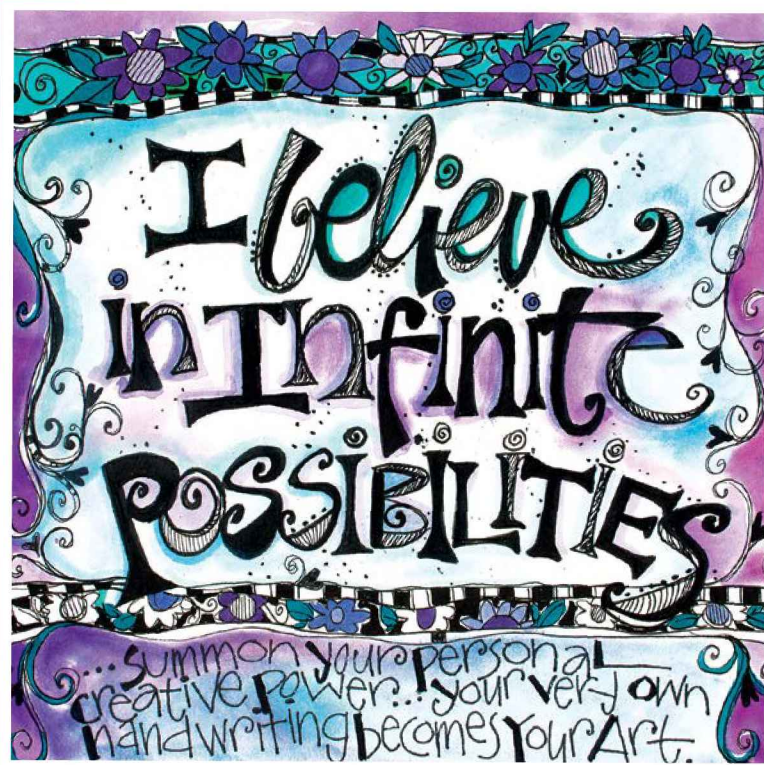
Your "inner font" emerges from a personal interpretation of alphabets and letters created with basic design elements, line variation, shape,

size, and pattern. If you can write your name, you can letter with creative flair. Exploring new materials, stretching your existing supplies, and manipulating line, shape, and form are the key elements to the development of an artistic lettering style. Call on your own creativity to design a signature font and make your handwriting a personal expression.

Practice, patience, and openness to explore alphabets as an art form will define your signature style and authentic artful lettering. "Play, practice, write, repeat" is the mantra I teach my students learning about artful lettering.

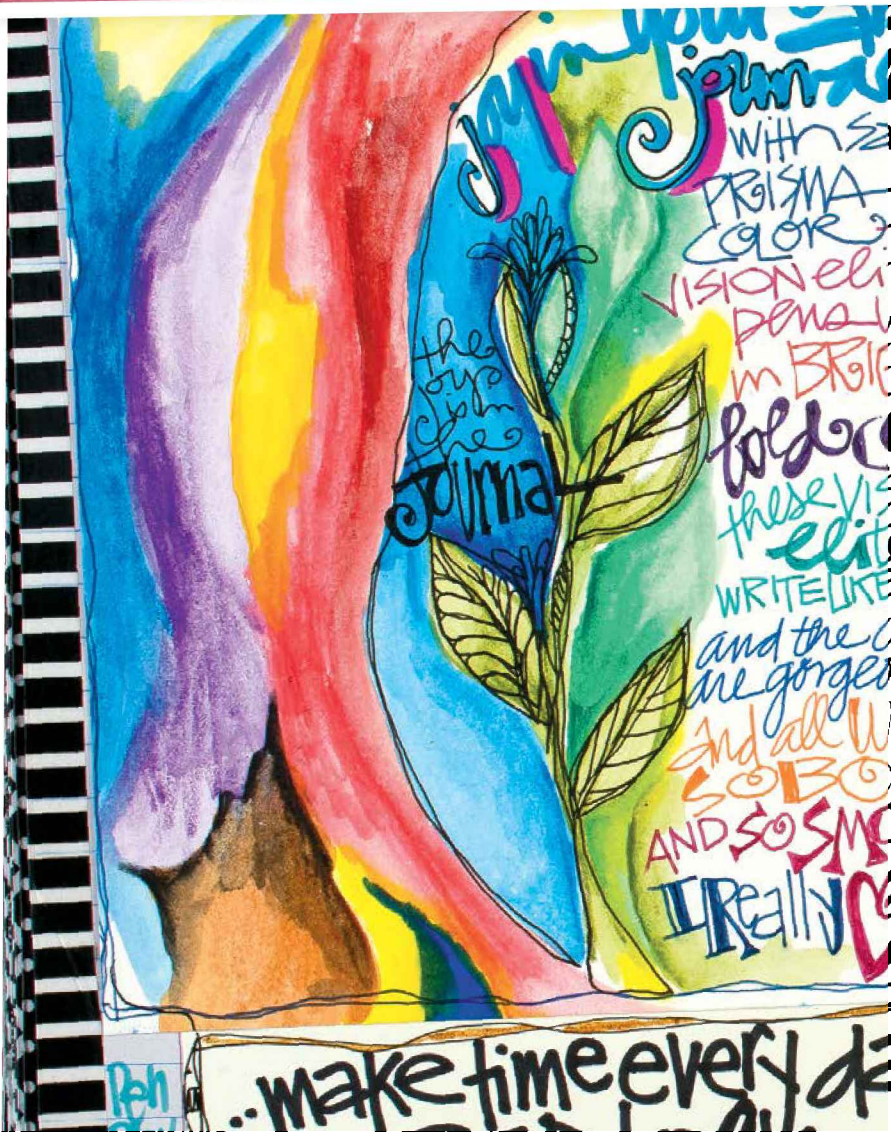
In this book, I share the techniques and approaches I use consistently in my lettering art. Practice them, play with them, and then let your own inner font emerge to make the art you have always had the power to create.

# the Whimsical Lettering Studio

What are the best pens, inks, markers, papers, journals, and substrates for lettering? I'll share my favorites with you and show you how they contribute to the look and style of my lettering art. Of course I'm sure you can dig into your own stash to find comparable items. There are so many supplies to choose from, but the magic of lettering really comes from deep inside you.



# TOOLS OF THE TRADE

*Let's be honest, pens are like shoes. You can never have enough pens, or shoes! One really never needs another pen or more shoes, but when the perfect specimen appears, one must indulge.*

When lettering is used as creative expression, it's logical to use a variety of pens that create specific effects and letter looks. Be in constant pursuit of the "perfect pen." I might suggest a certain pen that I love, but you have to decide for yourself what you're most comfortable with and what works for you and your budget. There are hundreds of pens and writing tools to choose from, each with a specific promise of performance. Different effects are achieved with specific tools.

## WATERPROOF PENS

An absolute necessity and the most basic lettering tool is the waterproof pen. With a waterproof pen, you can letter, doodle, draw, and add paints and water media without worrying about the ink bleeding. There are many styles and many brands, and any are fine as long as they don't bleed or smear when water media is added near them. Microns, Pitt, and Uniball Vision pens are waterproof, permanent pens and are ideal for fine writing and lettering. They come in various colors, but black pens in particular are my

favorites for lettering and adding doodled embellishments. I always have an assortment of black pens at my fingertips that will function perfectly for specific techniques. It's important to build a personal pen collection that includes a variety of tip styles, such as broad, fine, chisel, calligraphy, brush, etc., so you always have the perfect pen to achieve a certain letter look.

## MAGICAL MARKERS

There are dozens of types of markers in hundreds of colors and styles for writing and lettering techniques. There are alcohol ink markers that are permanent and waterproof, such as Copic, Prismacolor, Sharpie, and Spectrum Noir. Dye-based Tombow markers create intense watercolor effects. These markers have nylon or felt tips in bullet, chisel, and brush styles and are great for creating assorted thicknesses and letter variations.

## FOUNTAIN PENS

Get reacquainted with the beauty of an "old school" fountain pen with assorted waterproof or traditional

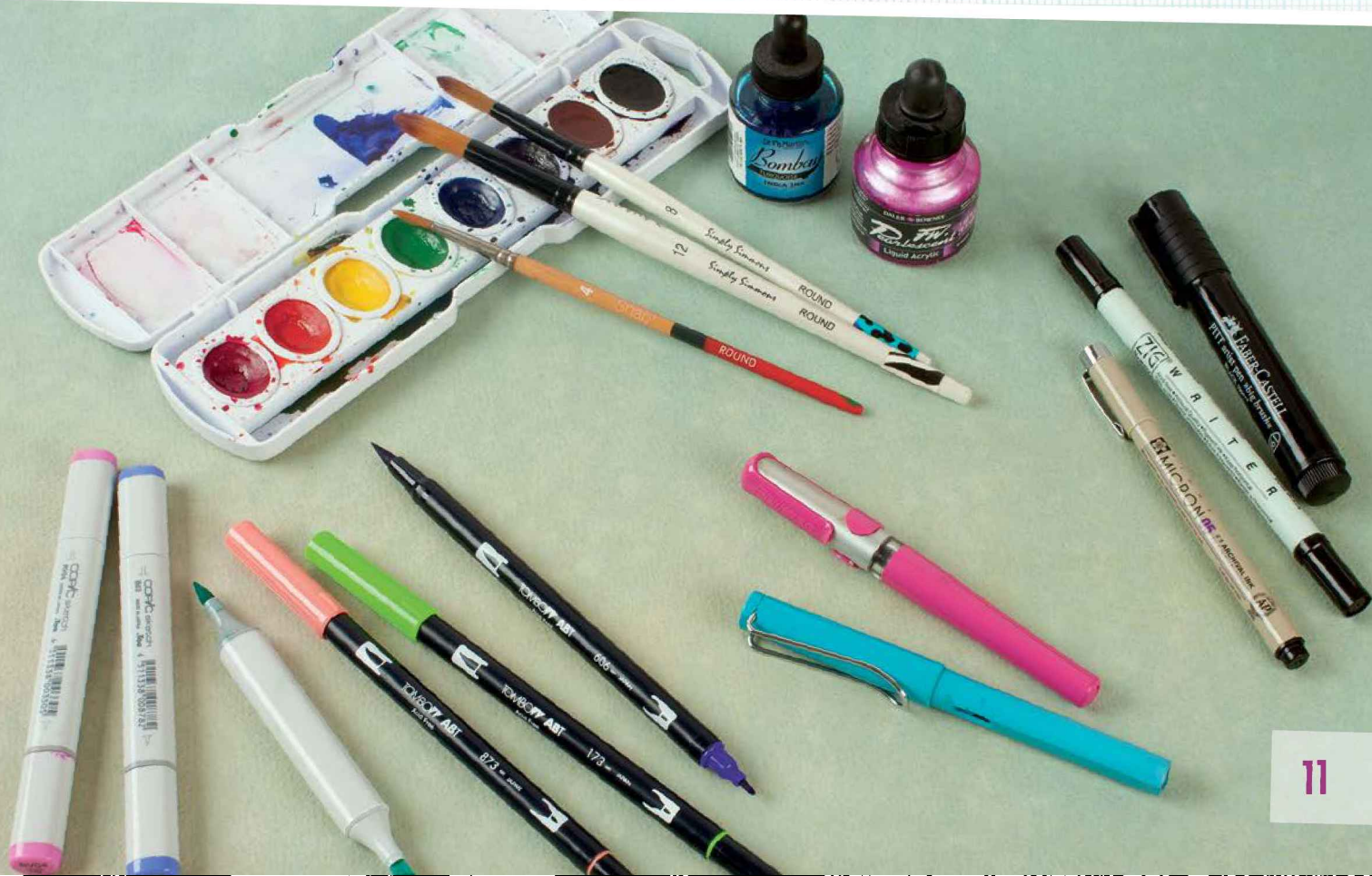




Some of my go-to lettering tools—clockwise from top left: watercolor paints, brushes, and lettering inks; waterproof pens; fountain pens, and markers

inks. A fountain pen is economical and refillable, so your favorite lettering look is always consistently available. There is something so pure and wonderful about watching wet, fresh ink glide across paper creating beautiful letters.

## PAINTBRUSHES, PAINT, AND INKS

Watercolor brushes in various sizes are an excellent choice for hand lettering. Loaded with inks or water-

color or acrylic paints, the soft bristles make it easy to create interesting letterforms. Depending on the size of the letters I'm creating, I prefer size #4, #8, #10, and #12 watercolor brushes. The best assortment of these brushes is usually found in a fine-art store.

## CALLIGRAPHY PENS

Created for traditional italic and decorative writing, calligraphy pens have metal nibs that are dipped into India and acrylic inks. This book doesn't go into detail on calligraphy, so if this traditional style of lettering

interests you, perhaps a formal class or instruction would be beneficial. But by all means, play with them to explore some of the techniques.

## PARALLEL PENS AND INK

This is a contemporary calligraphy pen with a crisp metal nib. It has a flat stainless steel tip that allows ink to flow through the tip to make thick and thin calligraphic pen strokes.

The ink for these pens comes in cartridges with refills in a variety of

colors. My personal preference, and the most popular brand of parallel pen, is the Pilot Parallel Pen, which comes with pre-loaded cartridges.

### WHITE PENS

Make a dramatic, bold statement with white ink on dark paper. I like Signo UM-153, Sakura gel, and Souffle white pens. Write slowly with this type of pen to allow for a consistent, smooth ink flow onto your paper surface. These pens work well

on most dark papers, as well as over inks, watercolor, and acrylic paint. Words, letters, and doodles pop right off the page.

### GLAZE/GLITTER PENS

Add sparkle and shine to letters with Sakura or Signo gel, glaze, metallic, and glitter pens. These pens have free-flowing ink that floats over paper with a velvet sheen.



## PAINT PENS

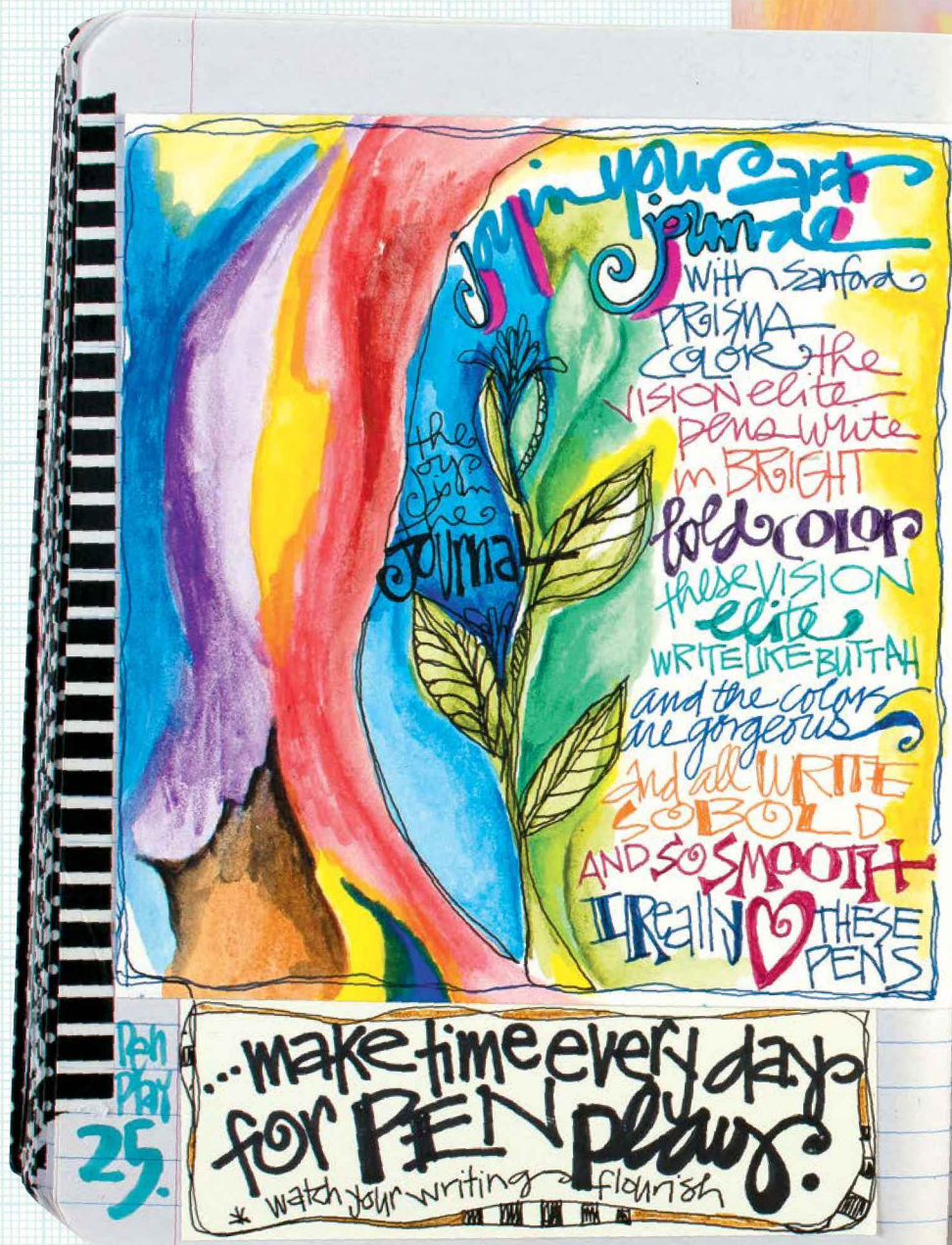
Sharpie and Montana make pens you can fill with acrylic paint. They create thick, bold lettering and are waterproof when dry.

## BRUSH PENS

There are many brush marker pens available that mimic a paintbrush in a marker form. They have nylon or polyester tips and are very convenient as the ink or paint comes already loaded in the brush.

## WATER BRUSH

A water brush has a reservoir you can fill with water so you don't have to dip your brush in a separate container. Niji and Sakura make water brushes with assorted tip sizes. Write with a water brush dipped in watercolor ink or paints for a casual, loose print or script style.





## DIMENSIONAL PAINT

Create colorful raised letters with the many brands of dimensional paints on the market. They are packaged in plastic bottles with pointed applicator tips that make it easy to letter. You might see them sold as “T-shirt” paints or “puffy paints.”

## GLUE STICK AND CRAFT FOIL

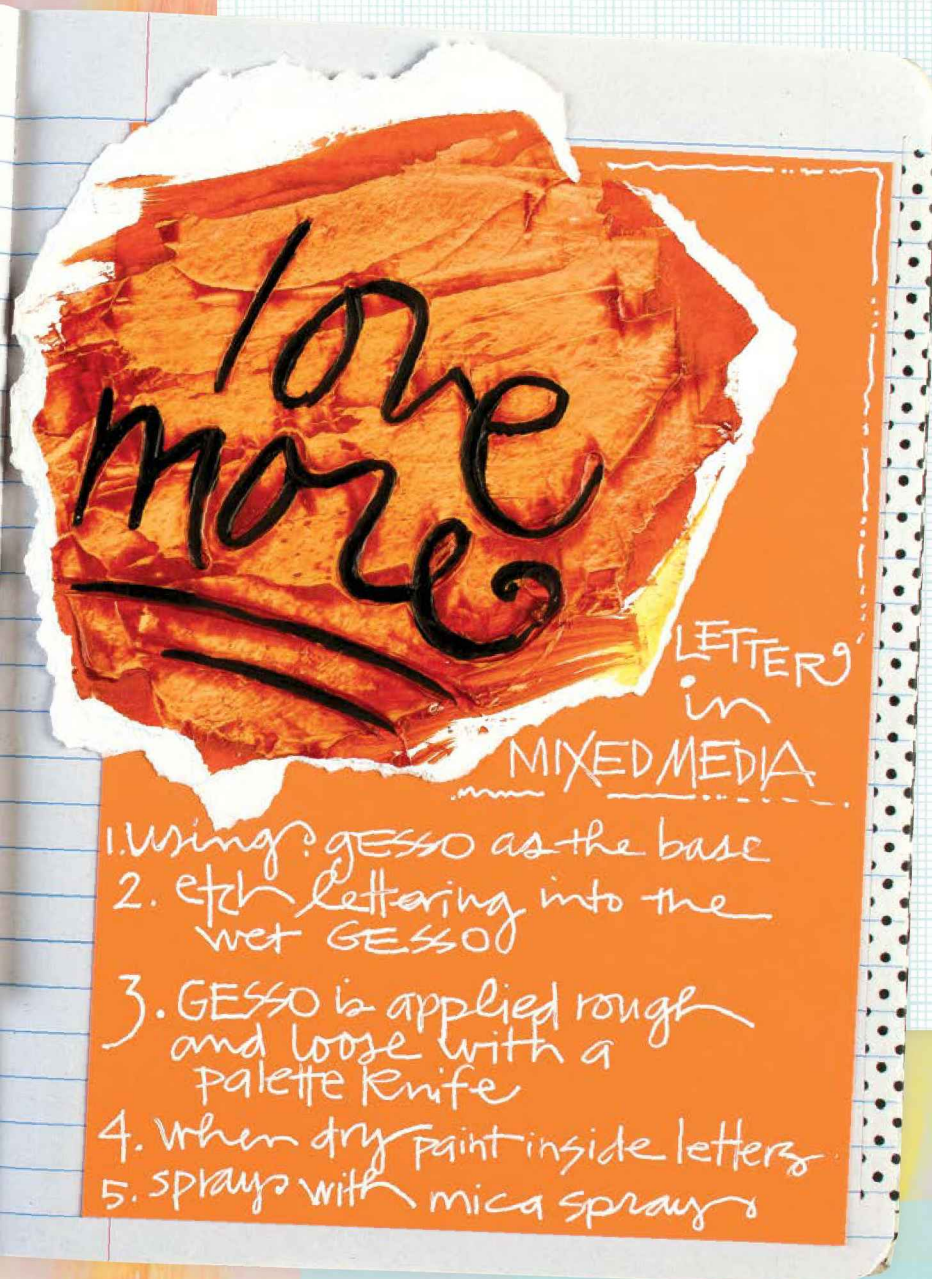
Write out letters and words with a glue stick and then adhere shiny craft foil to the surface and pull it off while it's still tacky. This creates a freehand metallic look for letters.

## GESSO

Gesso is an opaque acrylic paint primer with many uses. Get an interesting effect by applying white or black gesso to a surface with a paintbrush. Write into the wet gesso with a pointed tip such as the end of a paintbrush and let it dry. This creates an interesting textured and dimensional effect.

## GEL MEDIUMS

Create a resist under water-based paints and inks by lettering with a paintbrush dipped in gel medium. Gel medium is a versatile acrylic product that is used in mixed-media art as a glaze, collage glue, paint extender, and texture paste. When dry it is crystal clear. If you paint over the dried gel medium with watercolor or acrylic paint it acts as a resist. The raised lettering made with the gel medium will “pop” under the painted surface.



Writing in gesso creates a richly textured effect.



# PAPER AND OTHER SURFACES

*"What is the best paper to use for lettering?" I am asked this question constantly by my students. First, determine the purpose of your lettering project.*

Are you journaling your thoughts and ideas as a personal artistic expression no one else will see? In this case, less expensive journals and papers will probably be fine. Are you illustrating favorite words and quotes as a finished art book or keepsake? Are you making art to frame and hang on the wall? Is it a gift? Are you selling your artwork? For these purposes, you might consider a good-quality paper, journal, or canvas.

Decide why you're going to create lettering art. Are you exploring different styles to create your own signature look with pens, pencils, and markers? Are you experimenting with technique and exploring new styles requiring a lot of practice? Are you looking to paint, collage, sketch, and letter in just one art journal? Are you collecting ideas and inspirations? If the art is for your personal discovery, you can educate yourself

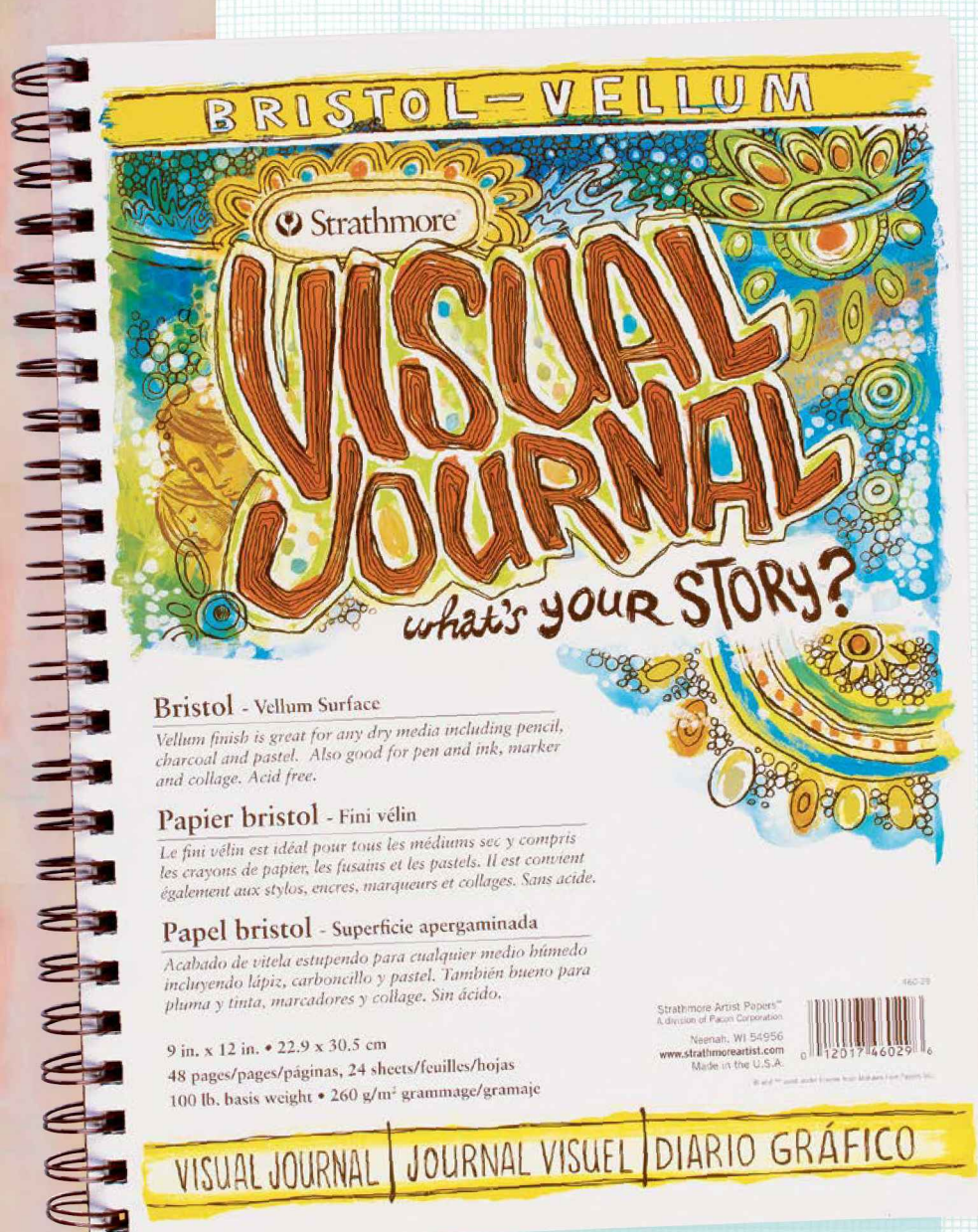
with various qualities and price points of papers and journals.

Regardless of what your creative process demands, it's a good idea to explore a variety of materials to meet your needs. Become familiar with student-quality papers and journals as well as professional grades that will be more costly. It really is your personal preference as to how much you want to invest in the materials for your projects, whether they are personal or professional. It's up to you to decide what fits into your lifestyle and budget.

## ART JOURNALS

There are many brands, paper types, and surface textures to choose from. A 90 lb or 140 lb smooth Bristol paper or a watercolor journal is my choice for mixed-media lettering. When working in a book-type journal, you want to make sure that it's going to be comfortable. Some books have spiral bindings that can

be a little awkward on your hand. There are others that are bound with signatures that don't always open completely flat for working, so you might want to take that into consideration. In a journal, I always make sure the binding opens flat so I can work across the entire two-page spread. My personal favorites are all of the varieties of Strathmore Visual Journals and the Moleskine and Hand Book brand journals.

## GRAPH PAPER

To get comfortable and confident with letter spacing, height, and design, keep piles or pads of graph paper handy. It's a staple in the exploration of lettering and fairly inexpensive to use as practice paper. The lines will help you to fully grasp the dimensions of letterforms and explore various composition and layouts.

## TRACING PAPER

A helpful practice is to trace by hand and duplicate actual letterforms on tracing paper to understand the feel and movement of letters. Find inspiration for your own font creations by copying the characteristics of printed letters.

## CANVAS

Pre-stretched canvases or canvas panels are interesting surfaces for painting in acrylic paints and textures and decorating with verses, quotes, and artwork. Canvases range in price from inexpensive to whatever your budget will bear. One of the techniques I enjoy is filling the surface with organic lines, whimsical shapes, and vibrant acrylic paint color, then writing an inspirational message with a water-resistant marker that works on a nonporous surface.

## WATERCOLOR PAPER

Much of my inspirational art and illustration is done on watercolor paper or in a watercolor-paper journal. The light, sheer, vibrant colors of watercolor paint make the most beautiful background surface for washes and patterns for lettering art. I reach for watercolor most of the time, so I have a variety of hot press (a smooth surface—just think of the watercolor paper as being “ironed” smooth and flat) and cold-press papers (textured surface—think of being cold with

“goose bumps”). I get many interesting effects on both types of paper, and they both react differently when inked or lettered with pens and markers.

### PRINTING PAPER

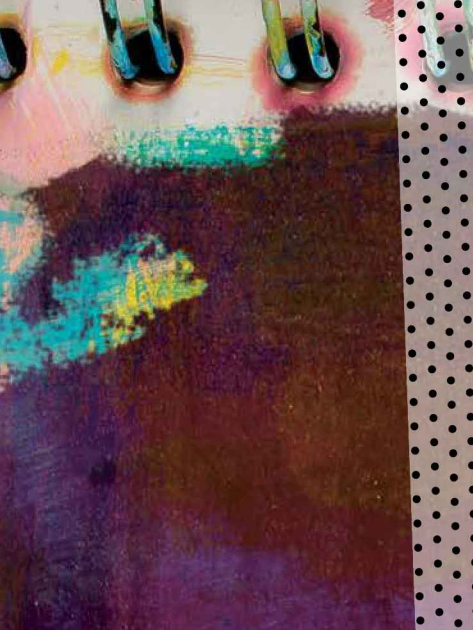
If you take my “Play, Practice, Write, Repeat” mantra to heart, you will use reams and reams of inexpensive printer or copier paper for practice. Write and write until you love your efforts and keep the good papers pasted in a lettering journal. You can create wonderful collage elements

by cutting or tearing up your lettering pages and adding them to other artwork as design elements and paper embellishments.

### CARDSTOCK

Heavy paper is perfect for marker or paint techniques that require more saturation of inks or layers. Many brands of cardstock in white, buff, and assorted colors are easily accessible at craft and art stores, as well as office supply stores. Again, practice pieces done on these papers can be nicely incorporated into other artwork or collaged journal pages. Always keep your favorites to use at another time.

# Letter Love Inspiration Journal

One of my greatest personal resources is what I call my Letter Love Inspiration Journal. This is a very casual journal, filled with ideas, messy practice pieces, scribbles, notes, fonts, and samples showcasing all things I love about lettering. In this chapter, you can take a peek inside my journal and discover some prompts and inspiration for creating your own lettering journal.



# THE JOYS OF JOURNALING

My journal is really a place to play, with no judgments or critiques. It's my personal collection of practice letters, scribbled ideas, and thoughts about what inspires me about how I create my own distinct style of lettering.

This is really an important part of my process for creating new designs and direction in my lettering. To me, lettering is my art, and I constantly have to grow with my art. As an artist, I am always seeking inspiration, ideas, and influence from my surroundings, whether in my own imagination, my daily life, or travels.

As you become more aware and curious about artful lettering, identify the elements of letterforms that inspire you to pursue these ideas with creative wings. Be brave and

try new movements with your hand and arm as you write, stretching and exploring which direction feels most natural to you. Always be on the lookout for interesting images, lettering styles, fonts, creative layouts, and designs. Gather items from the Internet, books, magazines, junk mail, brochures, travel memorabilia, etc. Fill your journal with bits of lettering treasures, clippings, practice samples, and ideas.

Use small journals in a landscape format to experiment with word layouts and compositions.





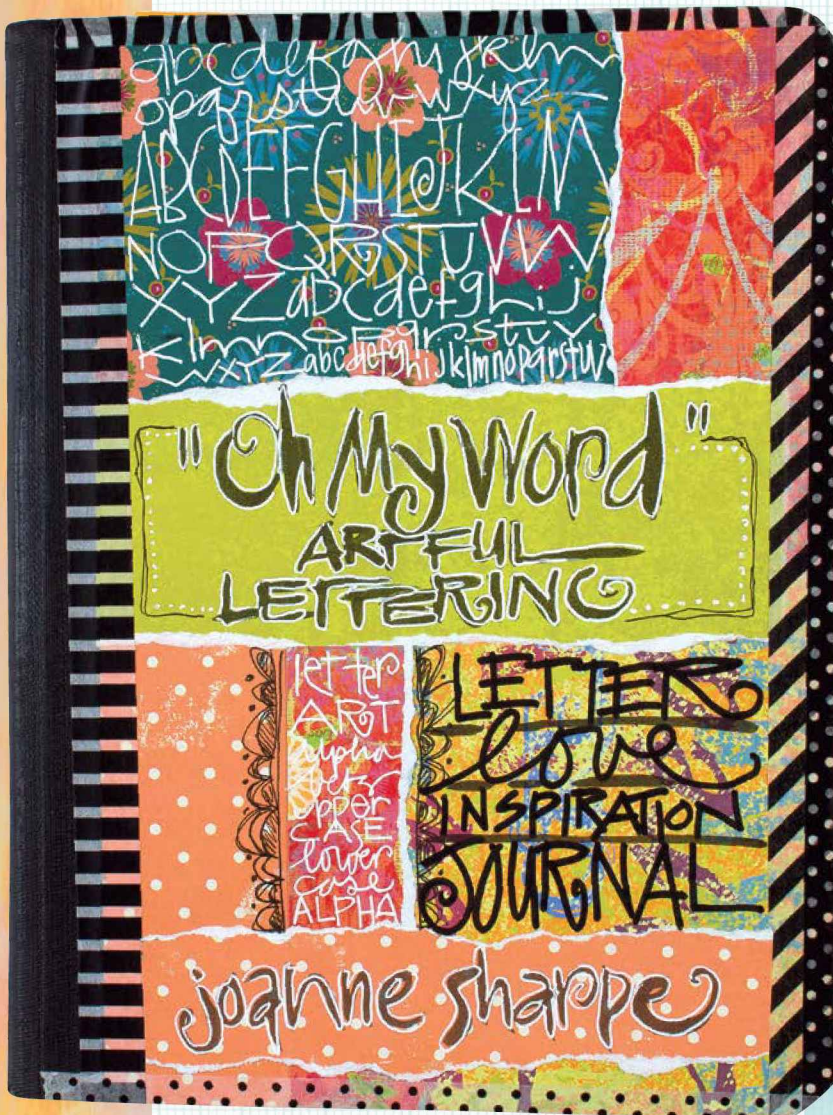
# MAKING YOUR OWN LETTER LOVE JOURNAL

*Make your own lettering inspiration journal using a simple, inexpensive composition book.*

Glue every other page together with glue stick to make the pages stronger. Use assorted pens and materials

to decorate, design, and color pages with lettering, words, quotes, and ideas. Record every creative whim on the pages until it's overstuffed with ideas and inspiration. Save your piles of paper doodles and scribbles and paste them into your book.

As you use this space, experiment and develop your own personal style using images and designs that speak to you. Don't worry about how the pages look; just fill them up. This journal is a place for experimentation and collecting ideas that make you swoon.



## TIP

You can reinforce the edges of the pages with fun, decorative washi tape, which is a low-adhesive colorful masking tape found in art and craft stores.

Using assorted markers and pens, decorate the cover of your Letter Love journal in your own personal lettering style.

In the pages that follow, I share excerpts from my own personal journal along with prompts to guide you in filling your own Letter Love Inspiration Journal.

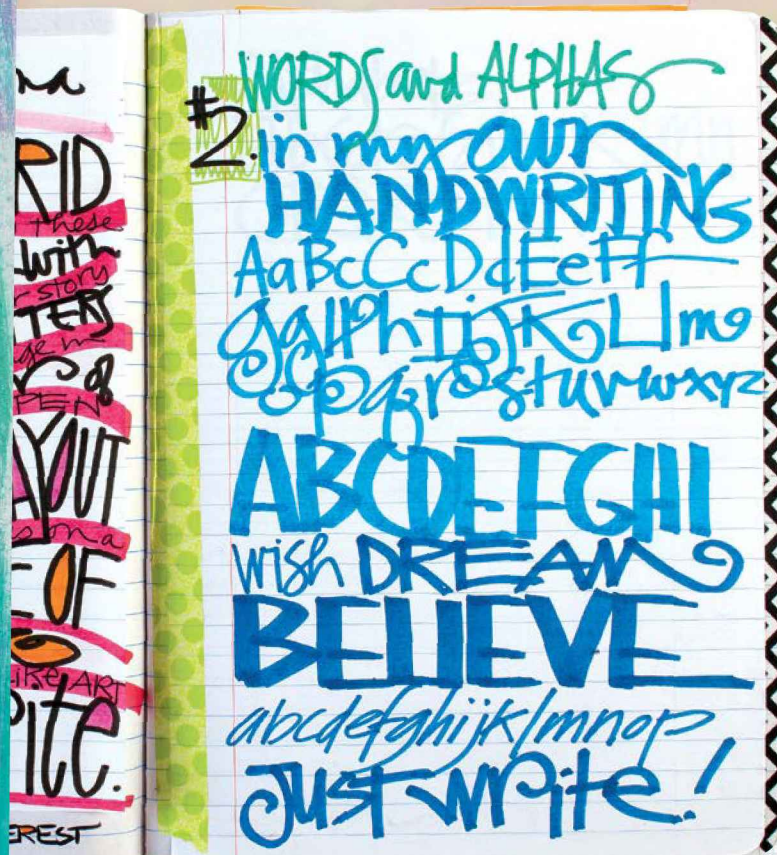
Grab a fresh blank notebook or journal and all your favorite journaling supplies in your personal art stash. Begin your lettering adventure by filling pages with these playful activities. You'll end up with at least twenty-five pages instantly!

Remember, your journal is a safe, fun place to experiment with ideas for lettering. The pages of ideas and practice work in this journal are not meant to be perfect. This is how you will learn, how you know what works.



- 1 Play around with your own handwriting, creating words and entire alphabets with all the pens or markers on your desk.





2 Write several pages of words and alphabets in all capital letters, upper and lower case, large, small, tall, wide, skinny, and fat. Don't judge, just write pages and pages, sampling your letter flow and creativity.

3 Doodle letters with colored markers. Add colorful patterns, swirls, stripes, lines, and dots to embellish the letters.

4 Look through old magazines and other printed materials to find words and phrases in assorted typefaces and sizes that you find interesting. Cut them out and paste them in your journal. Become a pasting pack rat with anything that you hand letter and make sure it ends up in your journal.

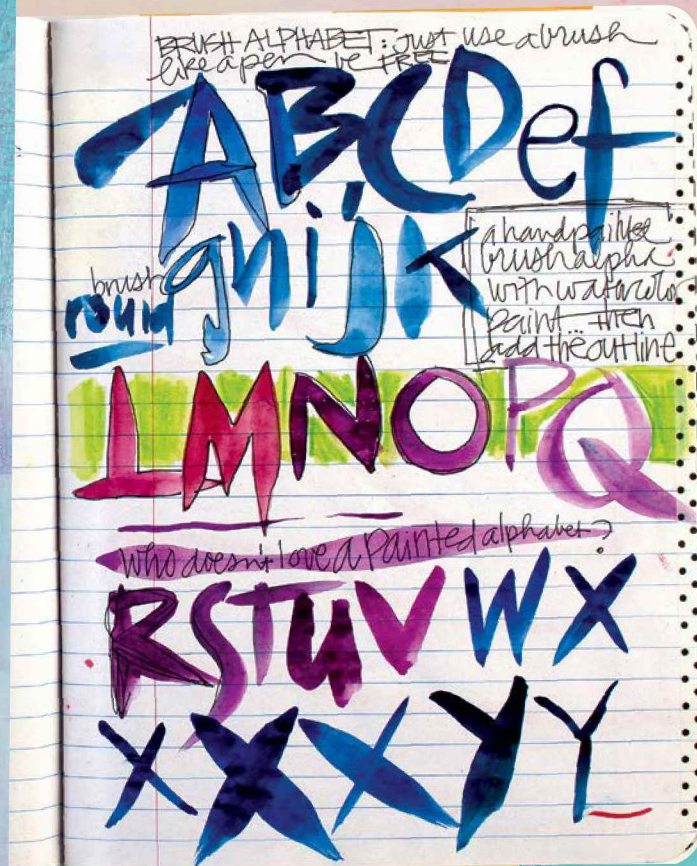
- 9 Collect samples of interesting maps and old book pages and glue them into your journal. Use them as backgrounds for your lettering.

- 10 Purchase some new pens you've never used before. Start to define your own alphabets and lettering using the features of the new materials.

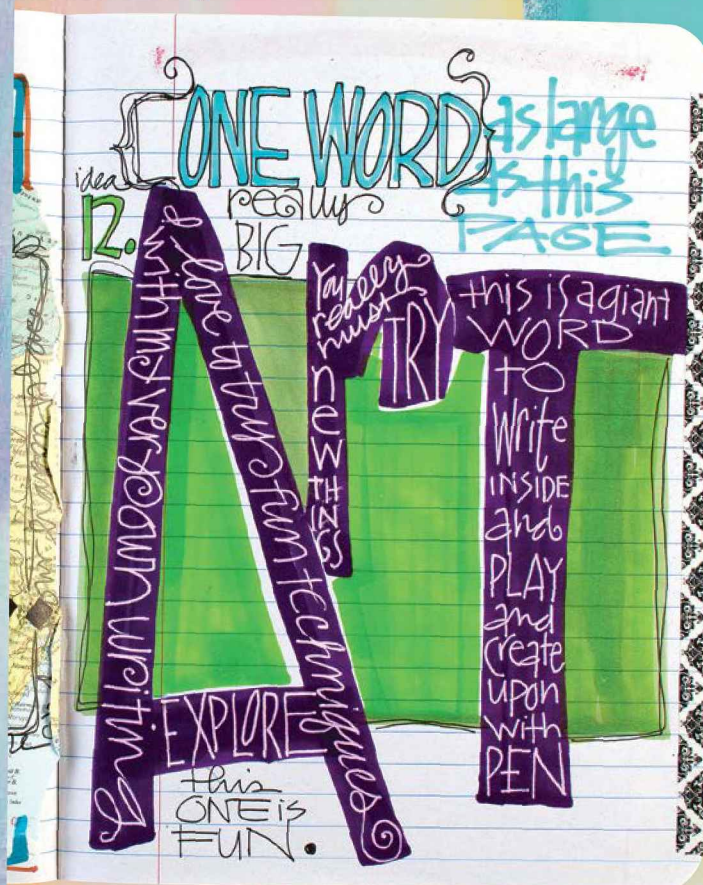

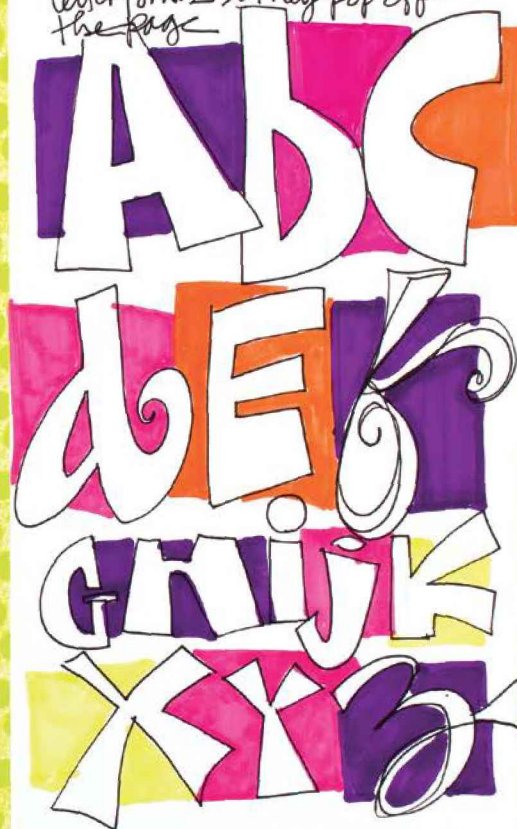

# Artful Letter Plays

It's essential to try new things and have fun with the creative process. In this chapter, you'll experiment with pens, markers, paints, and other materials to learn how to transform your own handwriting into art. I'll share the techniques I use consistently in my own personal artwork. These are the fundamentals of whimsical lettering.



# HANDWRITING AS ART

These days, we are consumed by type and text from computers and other electronic devices that just pump out cold, impersonal characters. Lettering and handwriting is a lost art in a technological age. I've heard recently of school districts considering the elimination of handwriting education for young children, since they are using more electronic devices in classrooms. What a disaster that would be! Can you imagine?

Handwriting is a part of our expression as human beings and is unique to who we are. As children, we learned to write with specific rules and instruction. But as individuals, we soon developed our own writing style that is unique to our own personality. No two people have the exact same handwriting. So why not take the fundamentals of your individual hand and infuse some art and design principles to create whimsical lettering?

As a product of Catholic schools, I was strictly taught by disciplined nuns who demanded

perfection and conformity. I can still picture the cursive alphabet cards posted in the skinny cork borders above the chalkboard. (Oh, yes, dusty, messy chalkboards, remember when we had those in school?) As an adult lettering artist, I find great value in those principles and rules, as I was taught to appreciate the beauty of every perfect line and distinctive curve that formed each individual letter. It's by mastering the basics that I was able to veer off the "conformity course" and create my own signature hand lettering.

# EVERYDAY WRITING

If you're going to play with, learn, and explore new lettering techniques, you must start with your very own personal printing and cursive writing. Allow it to evolve into an artful expression. Here are a few tips to get you on the path to creating whimsical lettering every day.

Shake your hands and arms and loosen up before you place a writing utensil in your hand.

Let go of your inhibitions and fear of failure. This isn't formal calligraphy. This is whimsical lettering—creative expressions and exploration of letterforms—using the writing you have harbored and evolved since childhood.

Forget about the excuse, “But I hate my own handwriting.” Put that thought right out of your mind. Be confident with your own skills and that you have the power to make wonderful works of inspirational and meaningful art from your own handwriting. You can do this!

Try using unfamiliar supplies, such as brand-new pens, pencils, markers, paintbrushes, etc.

Step out of your comfort zone and experiment with altering your handwriting, leaning your letters to the left if you normally lean right, and vice versa.

Get into a "pen Zen" or "pen trance" and just write! Pick a favorite pen and write in a designated practice journal for 15 or 20 minutes, in cursive or print, as a warm-up exercise before you begin your lettering art. Write words continuously without picking the pen up off the page. Letter your thoughts without stopping.

Treat yourself to a fountain pen and practice the art of handwriting every day. Fountain pens are not disposable, and you actually have to fill them with real ink. That makes fountain pens hip, happening, and very green.

Write something every day. There is great pleasure to be found in the art of handwriting. In the age of keyboards, touch pads, and technology, it feels good to have a real pen in your hand, making

# ARTFUL BASICS

There are several techniques I call my "artful basics," which I incorporate into my own personal lettering art and teaching. My "artful lettering" theory revolves around the concept of designing handmade, stylized writing and expressions that extend from an individual's knowledge of basic print and cursive writing.

The foundation of this type of lettering art is built on manipulating simple letters and basic alphabets with assorted art materials and creative design techniques. You have to start with the basics to discover and inspire your direction. Like any new craft, hobby, or activity that

you choose to explore, you will best succeed with much practice, consistency, and more practice. Remember, the secret to success in developing your own signature lettering style is "Play, Practice, Write, Repeat!"

## THE PENCIL SKETCH

A pencil is always a safe tool, lending confidence to creative endeavors. Write out the words of a favorite quote, using your own handwriting and watch it evolve by following these steps. Can you see how you designed a new font with your very own style?

### TIP

Vary the thickness of the letters by tracing close to the pencil letters or farther away from them.





## PUMP IT UP

Starting with your own style of lettering, write out some words, then creatively thicken the letters, adding weight to the letter shape to create a completely new style. Use this technique to make your own "pumped up" alphabet.



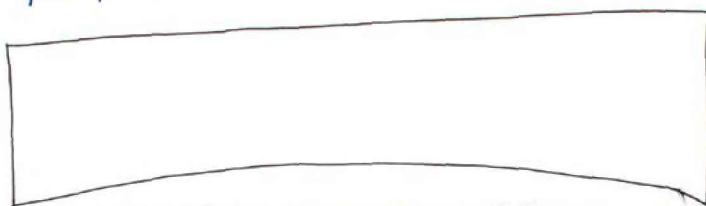

- 2 Use black or dark-colored markers to make the "swish" stroke for the lettering background.
- 3 Letter words and quotes with white ink pens (I like the Uniball Signo UM-153).



# STORY STRIPS

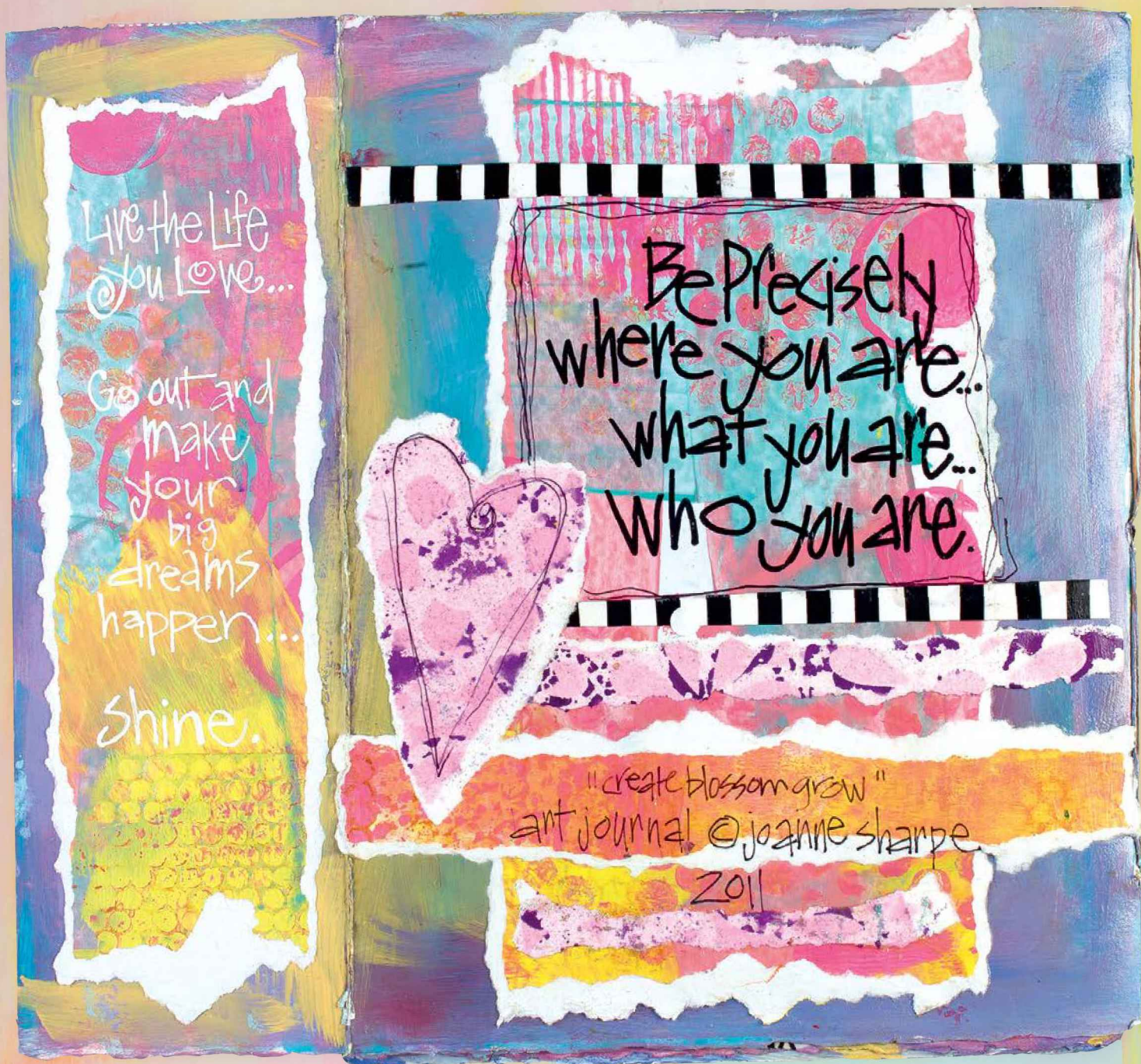
Tell a word story with a quote or phrase by creating text on strips and shapes of torn or cut paper, then adhering them to another paper or canvas surface.

## STEP BY STEP

- 1 Use painted or spray-stenciled background papers for lettering surfaces.
- 2 Tear the pages into 1" (2.5 cm) strips to be used horizontally.
- 3 Find a favorite quote or phrase to illustrate, lettering the words on the strips.
- 4 Arrange a pleasing composition and paste the strips on a journal page to showcase your lettered message.







*In this variation on story strips, I pasted strips of paper in different sizes and shapes onto a journal page before adding lettering.*



## FINE LINES, ARTFULLY DESIGNED

Change the expected appearance of letterforms and words by re-creating the shapes and adding interesting design elements.

### STEP BY STEP

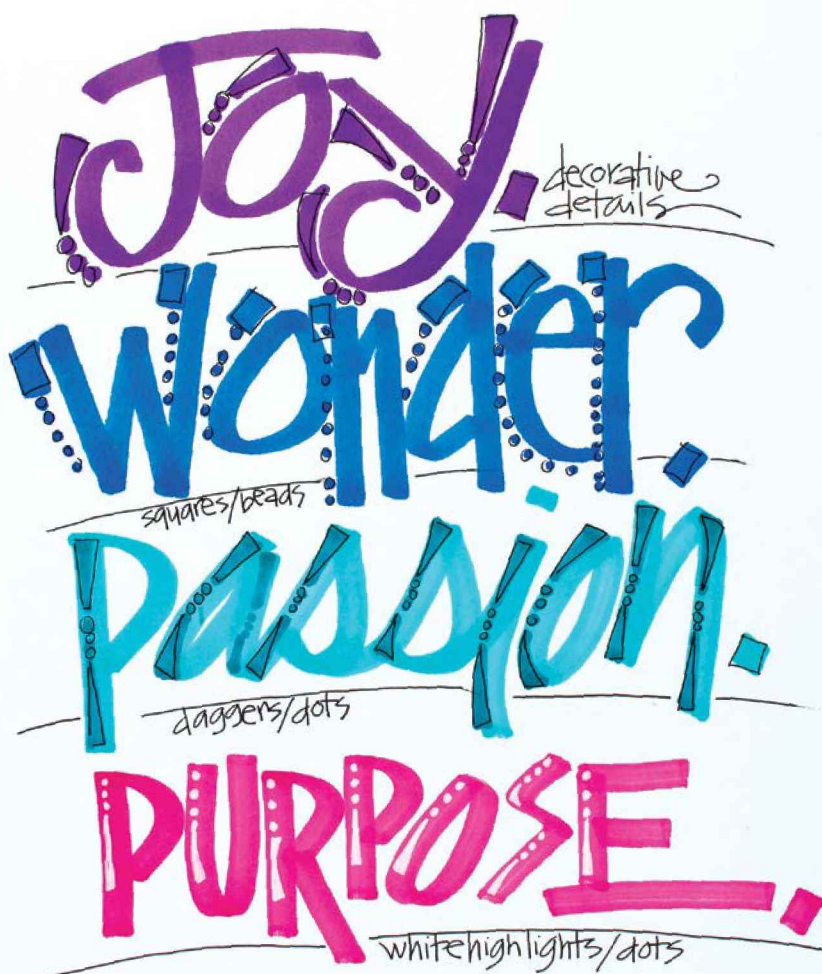
- 1 With a pencil, sketch the words first and then begin to elaborate the letterforms.
- 2 Add a creative and consistent art element (I used a heart shape in this sample) to each letter that unifies the look.
- 3 Commit to the designs and letters by using a black permanent pen to go over your designs.





## DECORATIVE DETAILS

Decorate inside and outside of the letters with doodle patterns and drawings that act like a highlight or embellishment.



### STEP BY STEP

- 1 Make your own stylized, funky letters by adding decorative squiggles, lines with dots, or decorations to one side of the letters in a word or alphabet.
- 2 Add the drawn doodle elements to imply a highlight or shadow on the outside of an individual letter.

### TIP

To be sure each letter is uniform and consistent, always place the added decorations on the same side of every letter.

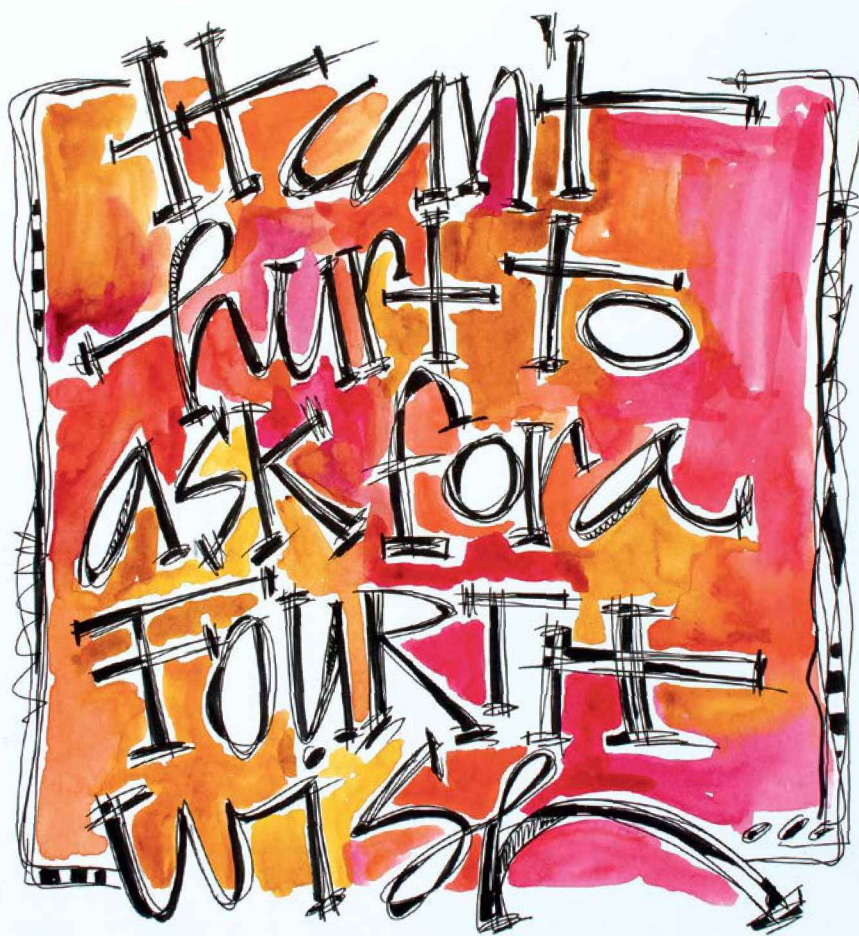


# SKETCHY CHARACTERS

Be loose and free with some "sketchy" writing to illustrate a message or quote.

## STEP BY STEP

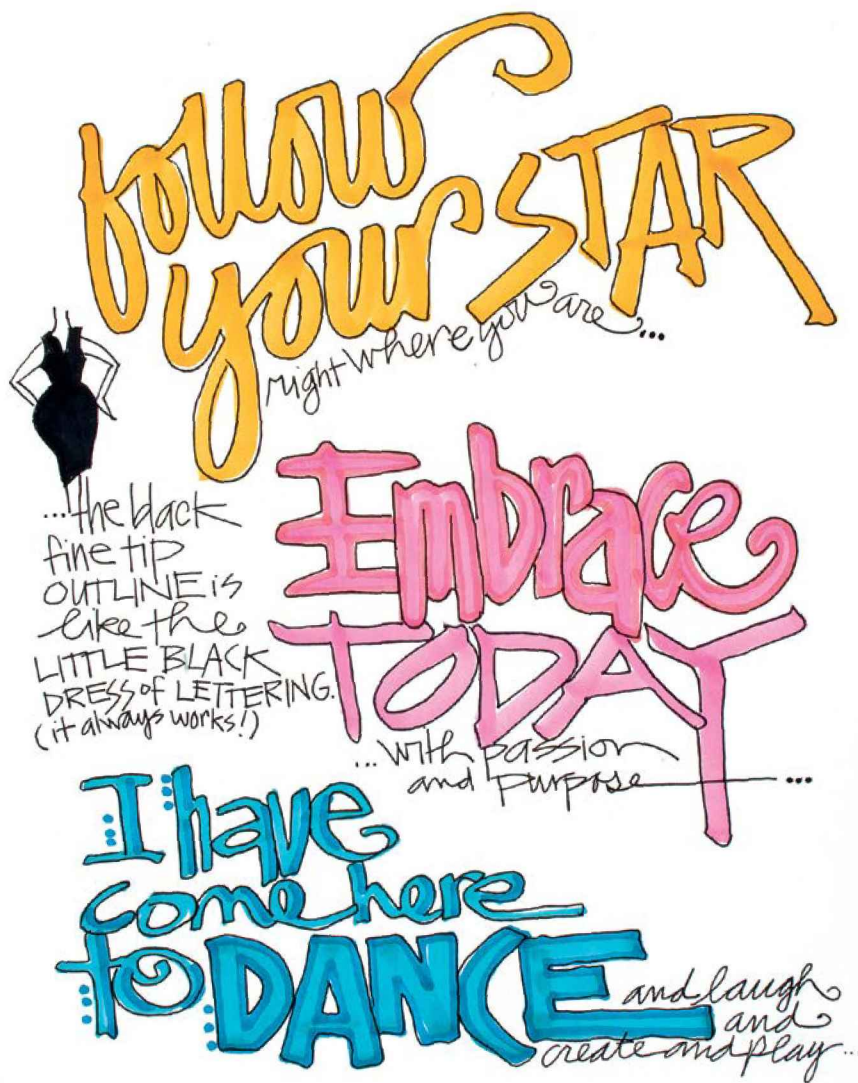
- 1 Write out the words in pencil, creating an interesting composition.
- 2 With a fine-tip black permanent marker, loosely sketch over each letter with several lines. Leaving some white in each letter, fill in some of the negative spaces created by the lines to give the letters weight.
- 3 Add color around the letters with watercolors or markers.





## LITTLE BLACK DRESS OUTLINES

The black fine tip outline is my "little black dress" of lettering art. This go-to technique always works to emphasize and ground letters and words on a page.



### STEP BY STEP

- 1 Make bold, bright colorful letters with various marker tips. Your handwriting is the art!
- 2 Outline each letter of each word with a thin-tip black marker or pen, tracing the shape or form exactly.

### TIP

Another variation on this style is to try the opposite approach and make bold black letters, then outline them with thin-tip colored pens.



# WORD STACKS

Focus on word placement and letter sizes to create dynamic visuals.

## STEP BY STEP

- 1 Vary the sizes and heights of words in a composition when illustrating a quote or phrase.
- 2 Add drama by exaggerating the size or giving prominence to specific words in the lettered art.
- 3 Letter a phrase on just the right, left, bottom, or top only of a journal page.
- 4 Write each word in various heights and widths to stretch horizontally and vertically, forming an invisible box shape for the composition.

## PAINTBRUSH PEN

Think outside the lettering box and let a paintbrush become the pen. "Write" with any watercolor paintbrush. I like a round #8 or #10 brush to create an alphabet.

### STEP BY STEP

- 1 Load the brush with watercolor paint, acrylic paint, acrylic ink, or India ink. Practice making thick and thin lines by adding and releasing pressure as you paint lines across a page.
- 2 When you are comfortable and confident with the movement of the ink in the brush, start to "paint write" letters as if the paintbrush was a pen or pencil.
- 3 Try varying the line thickness of letters with heavy and light pressure on the brush, releasing a small or large amount of liquid from the bristles.
- 4 Be loose and uninhibited when using this very expressive lettering technique. Stretch the lines, heights, and widths of each letter as if it's an individual art element.





## MAGIC MARKER SHAPES

Who doesn't love to write, draw, and color with markers? Make whimsical, colorful shapes to fill with words and letters using assorted markers and several techniques. Gather any brand of markers you have. When lettering, I prefer a dual-tip alcohol-based marker that is waterproof and has good color integrity, such as Copic, Prismacolor, or Faber-Castell.





## INKY GOODNESS

Experiment with unusual tools and assorted inks to create authentic hand-drawn letters.

### STEP BY STEP

- 1 Load an eyedropper with ink and squeeze out the liquid as you write words with the tip.
- 2 Use the end of a paintbrush, a wooden kabob skewer, or a cuticle stick dipped in India or acrylic ink to write out a phrase or inspirational message.
- 3 Use cut-up pieces of cardboard dipped in inks to create freeform letters.

## BLING IT, BABY

### STEP BY STEP

- 1 Use dimensional glaze pens to letter words in a journal or on a scrapbook page.
- 2 Add shiny glitter highlights to letters and artwork using the many glitter glues that are on the market.





Dimensional paint pens create raised lettering that pops off a page.



## HAND LETTERED, HAND CUT

Play with the organic, freeform look of a hand-cut stencil made in your own lettering style.

Use the scraps left behind from your handmade stencils, or the stencils themselves, as collage elements in other artwork.



### STEP BY STEP

- 1 Use cardstock, Mylar, or any heavy paper for your stencil.
- 2 Design your words or letters with a marker or pencil on the surface. Carefully cut out the shapes with scissors or a craft knife to reveal the image.
- 3 Use spray inks or paints to stencil your words on any artwork or journal pages.

### TIP

You could also arrange the cut-out letters on a page and spray around them. The paper letters will act like a mask and preserve the white of the paper.



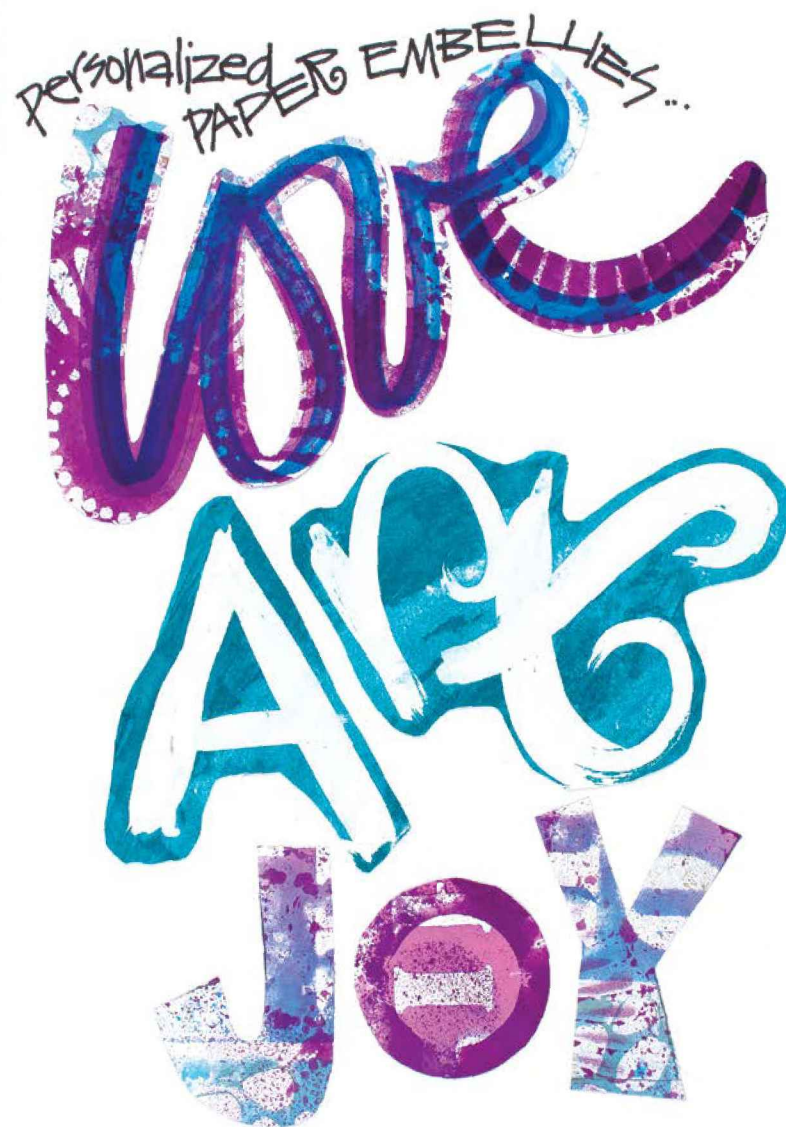


## PAPER WORD EMBELLIES

Make hand-cut letters and word embellishments from your own colorful painted papers. These are much more personal and one of a kind when using preprinted papers. Master this process and you'll never have to buy another commercial embellishment again!

### STEP BY STEP

- 1 Make some colorful background papers with stencils, inks, or paints on cardstock paper.
- 2 With a pencil, lightly sketch some block or script words on the papers.
- 3 Cut out the words with scissors or a craft knife to create a dimensional paper embellishment.
- 4 Add the letters to your journal or scrapbook page with a glue stick or your favorite adhesive.

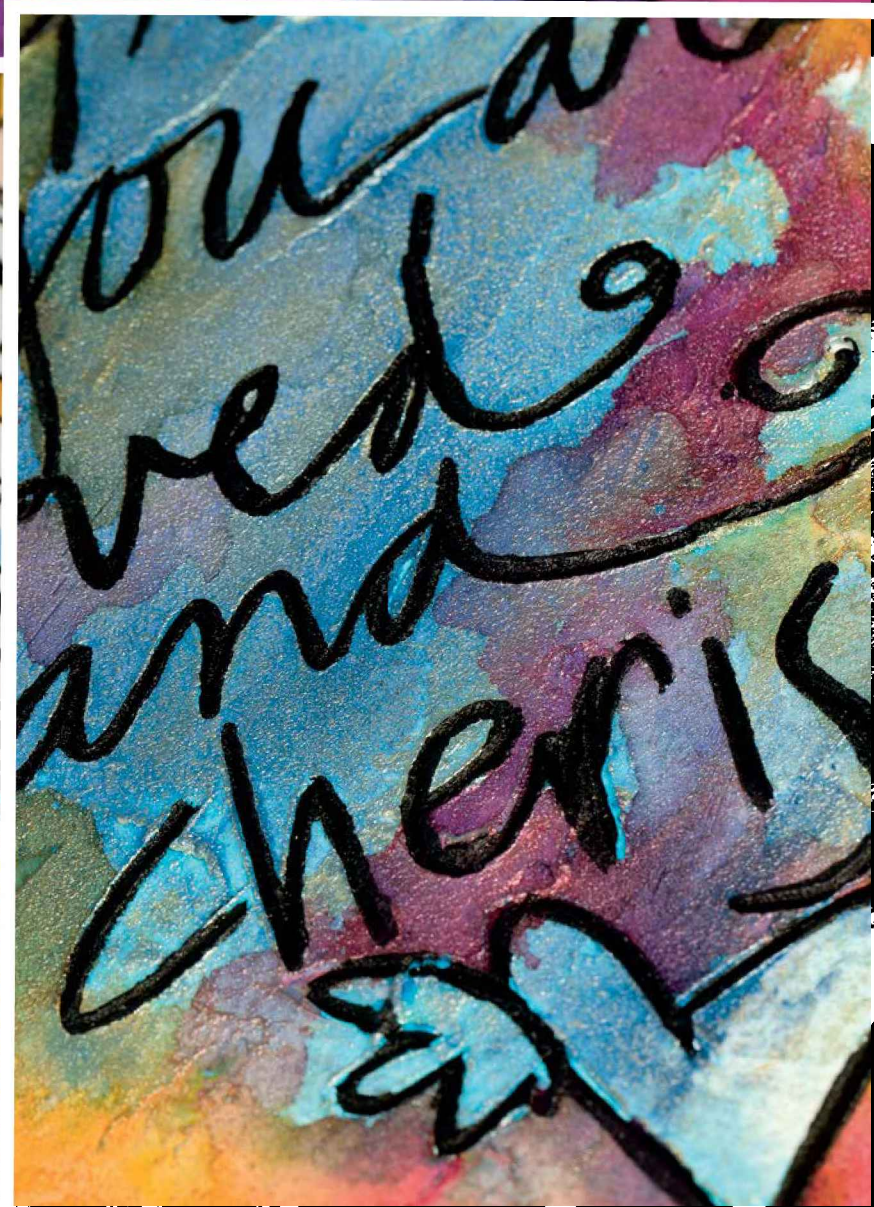
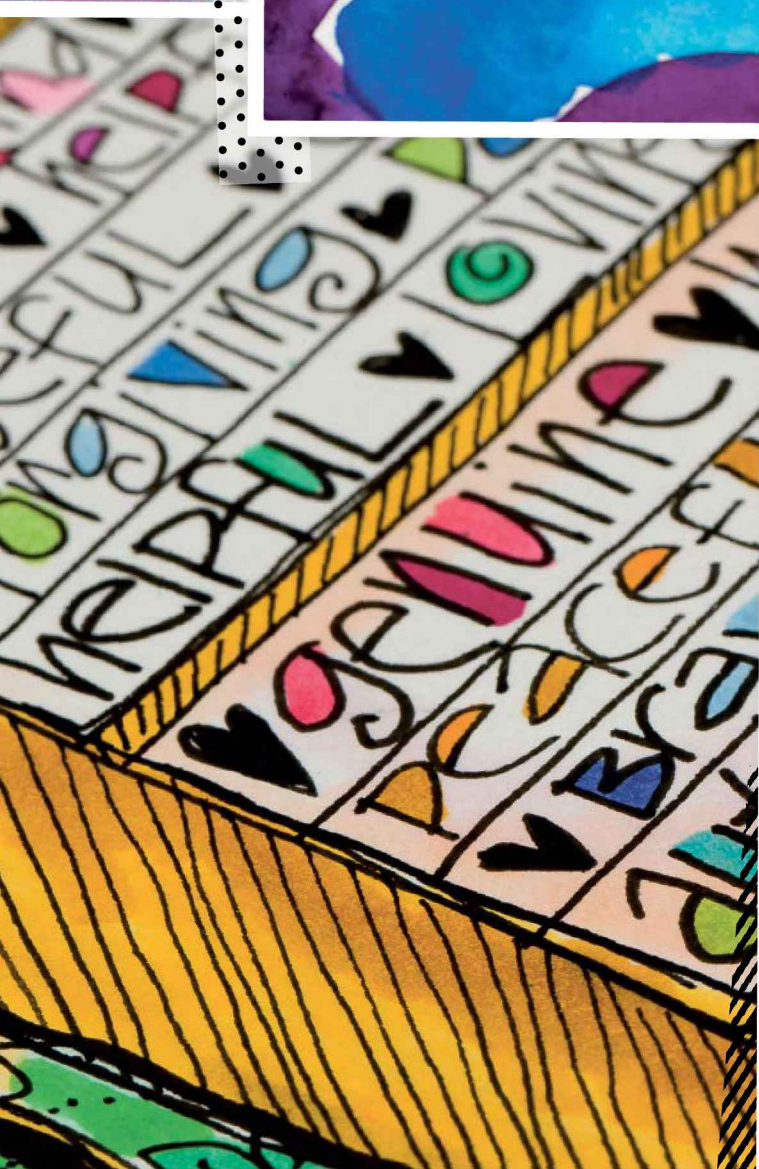


Having explored my go-to artful lettering techniques, are you impressed with the incredible artwork that came from your very own beautiful handwriting? Do you have a nice thick journal filled with your practice and learning pages? You can grow with these techniques and elaborate on the concepts to make art that is uniquely yours. Don't be concerned with imitating my samples exactly; be empowered by your own abilities. By being true to yourself, your potential for an exquisite personal lettering style is limitless. Be confident with your own writing as the foundation for stretching and growing artistically.

Embrace the techniques and methods that inspire you!

Be free and loose with your creative lettering, letting it flow from your heart and soul. Embrace your perfectly imperfect artful expressions. If you want perfect, flawless, even, smooth, straight letters, you can go print everything out on your computer. Take your time and try all of these techniques and see what speaks to your personal style. Just as you learned handwriting basics as a child, you have now learned the "whimsical lettering basics." You have the power; now make your own lettered magic.







# Artistic Alphabets

**T**hroughout this book I've talked about creating lettering art using your own personal handwriting, rather than just copying prescribed fonts. My approach to lettering is based on the idea of transforming a familiar practice with design principles for endless creative possibilities. In this chapter, I'll share fifteen alphabets to illustrate how I create them and to show how you can use them as a starting point for your own artistic alphabets.



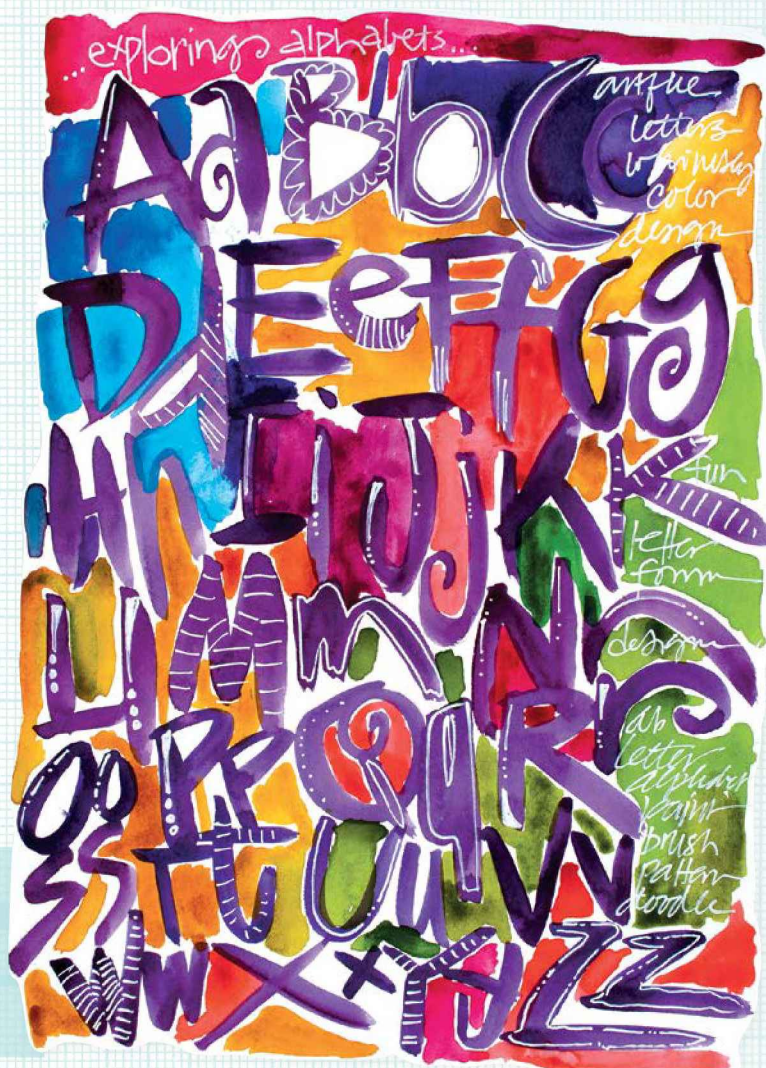
# MAKING SIGNATURE ALPHABETS

*Have you noticed that no one writes anymore? I find nothing more beautiful than putting pen to paper, especially with the freedom to make letters and alphabets however I choose.*

Hand lettering restores the human element, creating a social connection that no technology can match. Think about our history that was so dependent on handwritten letters describing life in past eras. Ink on paper, life shared. We wouldn't know much about the past if it weren't for handwritten accounts in letters, ledgers, and journals of days gone by.

In my life and art, I've always been fascinated by the history and evolution of letterforms. These discoveries inspire me to explore new ways of making freehand letters by moving a pen, marker, or brush and implementing traditional characteristics in my contemporary alphabets. Adding interesting lines or vintage decorative elements to alphabets

makes a dramatic impression for a quote, thought, or message.

As we explore the ideas in creating original art alphabets, know that this chapter is not about making the cutesy stuff. You know, the letters that look like bananas, balloons, and cupcakes, with hearts that dot the letter i. It's about inventing letters for a whole alphabet as a col-

lection with common elements such as line, shape, pattern, and decoration tying them together.

To make magical alphabets, you must fall in love with your own handwriting. Don't be overly critical of your regular writing, because it's the essential ingredient for this process. If you're not crazy about it, change how you think, knowing that it's just the foundation for letter making as artwork. In my teaching experience, I constantly hear so many people say, "I hate my writing" with the same conviction as they say, "I hate my nose," or any other personal physical characteristic. I'm pretty sure that transforming your handwriting into a personal art expression is a lot less painful than a nose job!

Be free, let it flow, and make it up as you go. Think past the ABCs you learned in elementary school and be adventurous with loose lines and inventive letter shapes. Dare to

be perfectly imperfect in discovering your inner font. You know the basics that you've used your entire life, now turn your letters into art by adding, drawing, changing, and inventing elements of basic letters. Do you see how the possibilities are infinite? The more alphabets you invent, the more your signature style will evolve.



# INGREDIENTS FOR CREATING AN ARTISTIC ALPHABET

There are specific ideas that I incorporate into my own hand-drawn alphabets.

Start with your own personal handwriting as the foundation for a new alphabet.

Try new pens, markers, and brushes to transform your ordinary writing and give it a fresh look and unexpected style.

Make sure every letter has a consistent element that unifies it as a member of a collection, such as an inventive line formation or embellishment.

Give the alphabet a name or title.

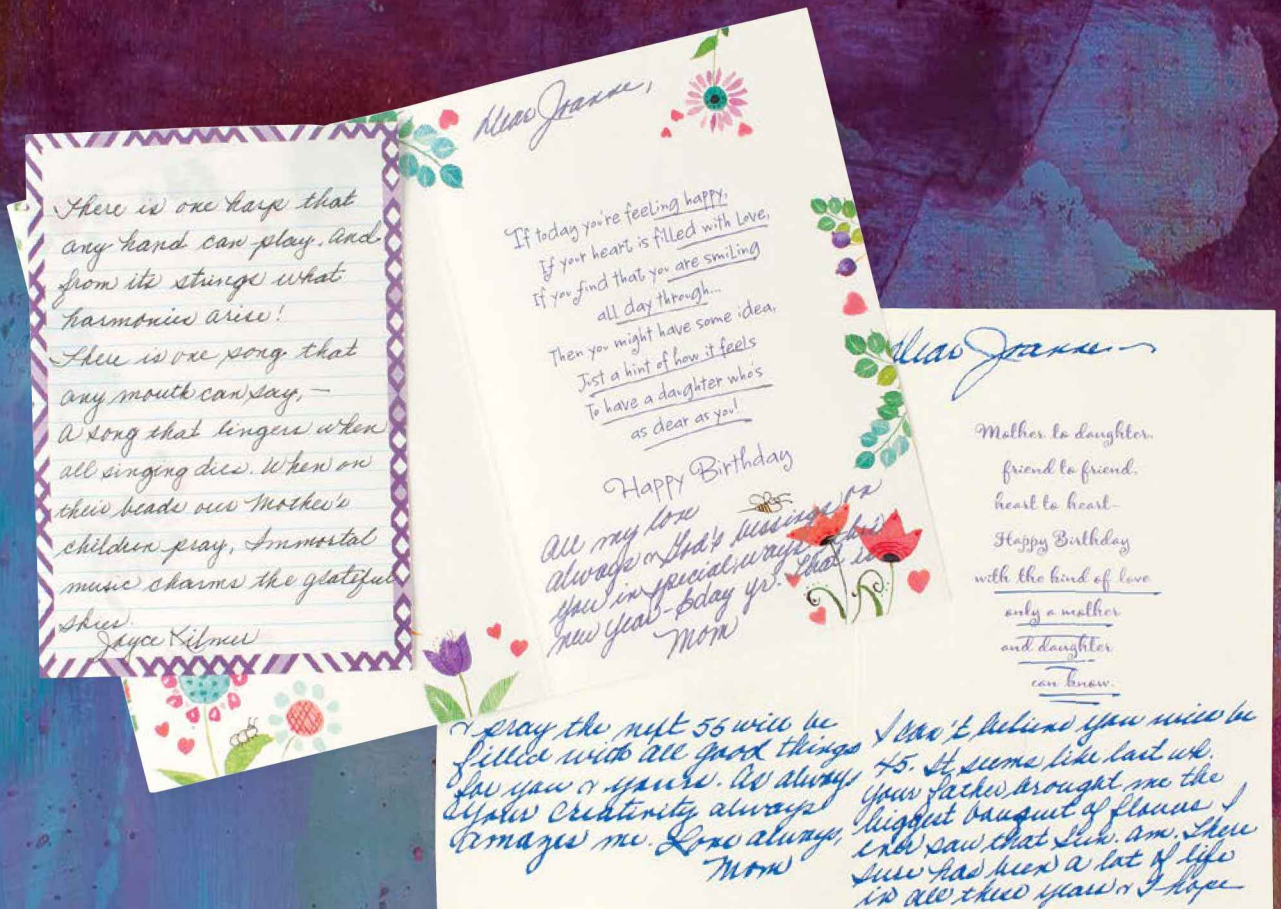


Just like the lined paper you used when you were first learning to write, a grid helps keep your letters in line.



## MOTHER KNOWS BEST

This would not be a true lettering book without celebrating my own mother's handwriting. Growing up in the shadows of her writing style was a huge inspiration in my love of lettering. It's very rare today to see such perfect letterforms. Educated in Catholic schools in the 1940s, Mom learned handwriting with the strict rules and disciplined teaching style of her era. Penmanship was a daily classroom activity, and students strove for perfection with the highest standards. Mom remembers vividly that J was her favorite letter to write and can recall the emotion attached to forming the letter. My birthday cards are always graced with the most perfect letter "J"!







## YOU ARE WHAT YOU LETTER

I have always loved words, art, and talking, and hand lettering has been one of my passions my entire life. My artwork always “speaks” with a colorful illustration and a personally designed alphabet or font appropriate for the message.

My personal “lettering notoriety” started in high school with my campaign for junior class president. Handmade, colorful flyers and posters with bold marker letters and posters saturated the hallways and cafeteria of Our Lady of Mercy High School. My slogan was “Go Wacky, Vote Zawacki.” (With a maiden name like Zawacki, what else could I do?) I won the office that year and senior class president the next year. For the past thirty years I’ve received notes or messages from my former classmates who see my artwork all over the world and say, “I knew it was your writing!” My handwriting paired with whimsical artwork has always identified who I am as an artist and human being. It is artwork that reflects my values and my personality and exposes the depths of who I am as an artist. My lettering is my art.

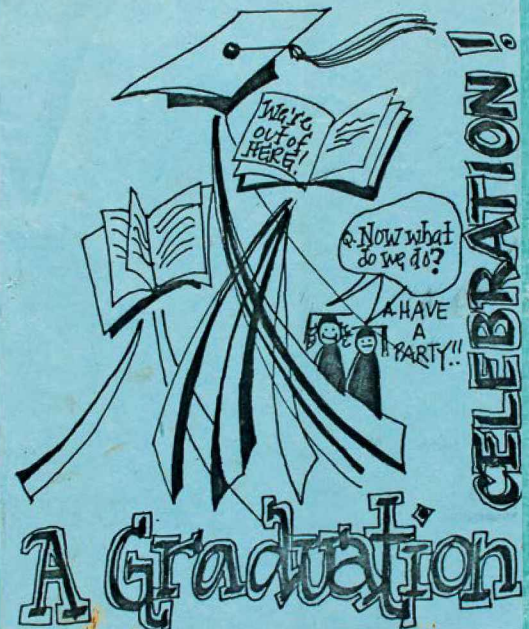
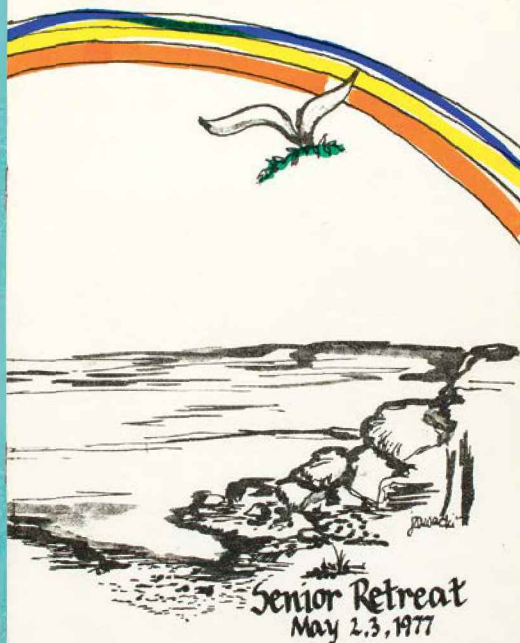

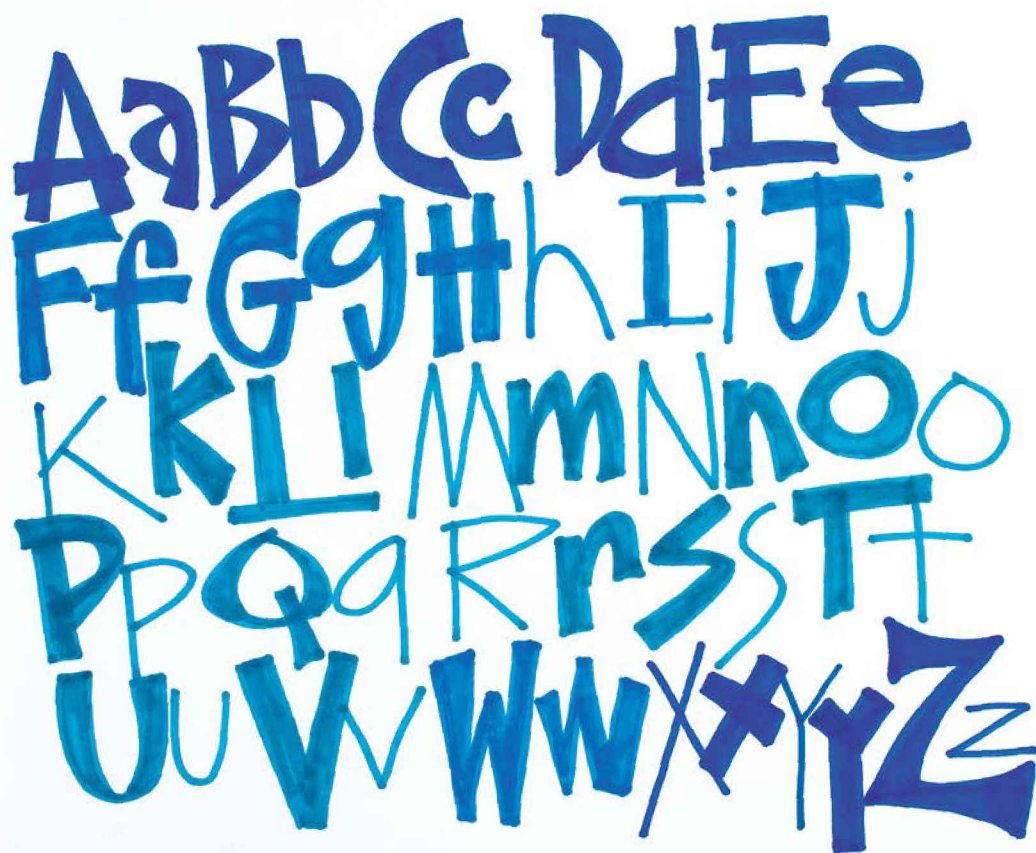


# ALPHA ART IN ACTION

These fifteen hand-lettered, stylized alphabets originated from my own print or cursive writing. Try the techniques I describe to create your own personalized alphabets, rather than simply copying mine. You'll recognize some of my basic artful lettering techniques from the last chapter and see entire alphabets created with those ideas.

## THICK IT

Transform your personal printing style by adding weight to each letter. Use both thick and thin lines to create new letterforms.





## PENCIL PERFECT

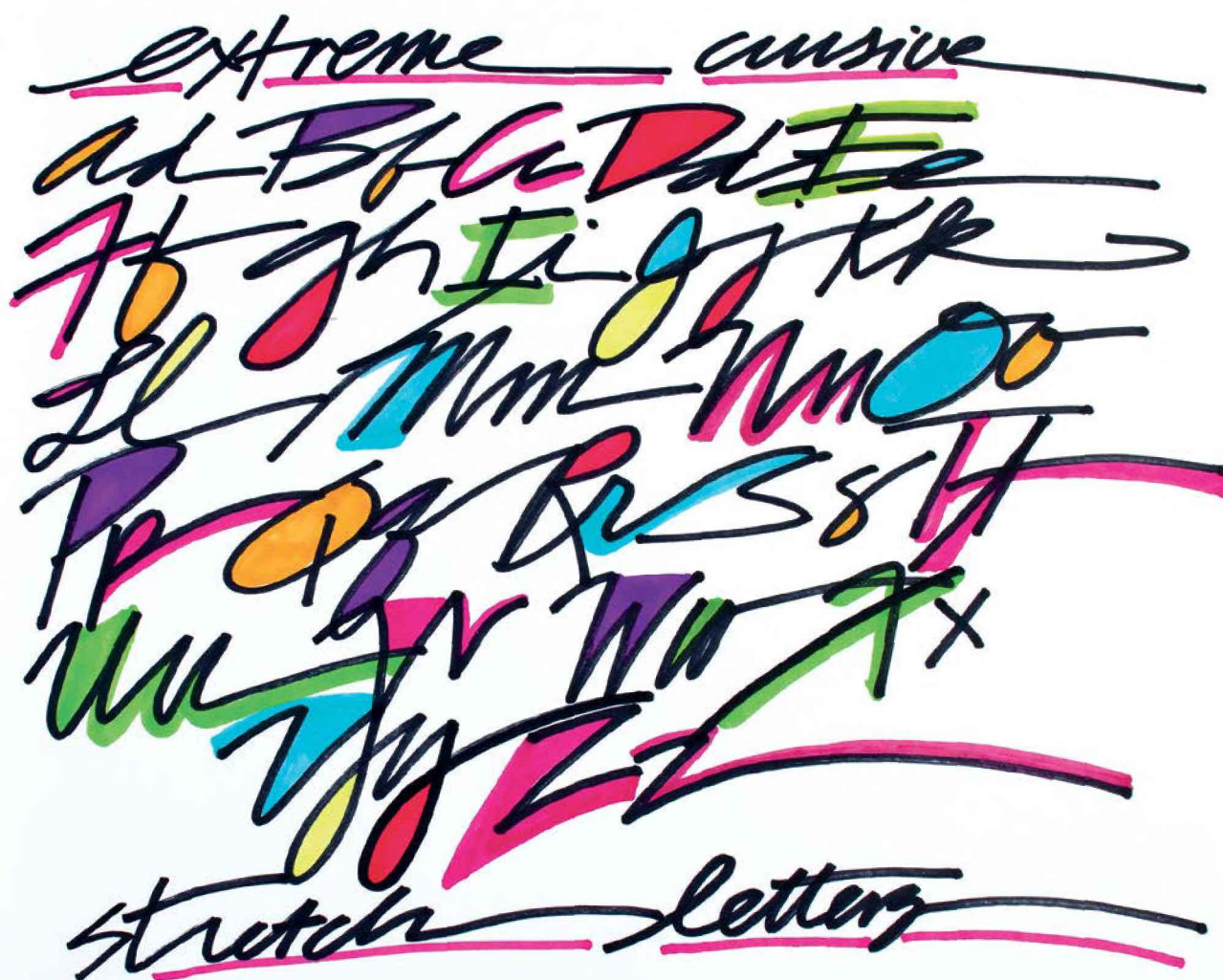
Write an alphabet in pencil and then trace around each shape in marker to invent a new letter shape. Erase the pencil lines to reveal a new one-of-a-kind font.





## EXTREME CURSIVE

Stretch your handwriting and experiment with extreme slants and loopy versions of your personal cursive writing.





Once you're in the whimsical lettering groove, you'll realize that the possibilities for creating lettering styles are endless. I have developed a system called the "Lettering Equation" to experiment and design different patterns of letters to create unique word art. I'm sure there is an actual mathematical formula that will determine how many ways you can write a single word, but that's all about numbers, and I'm all about the letters.

## CREATIVE COMBINATIONS

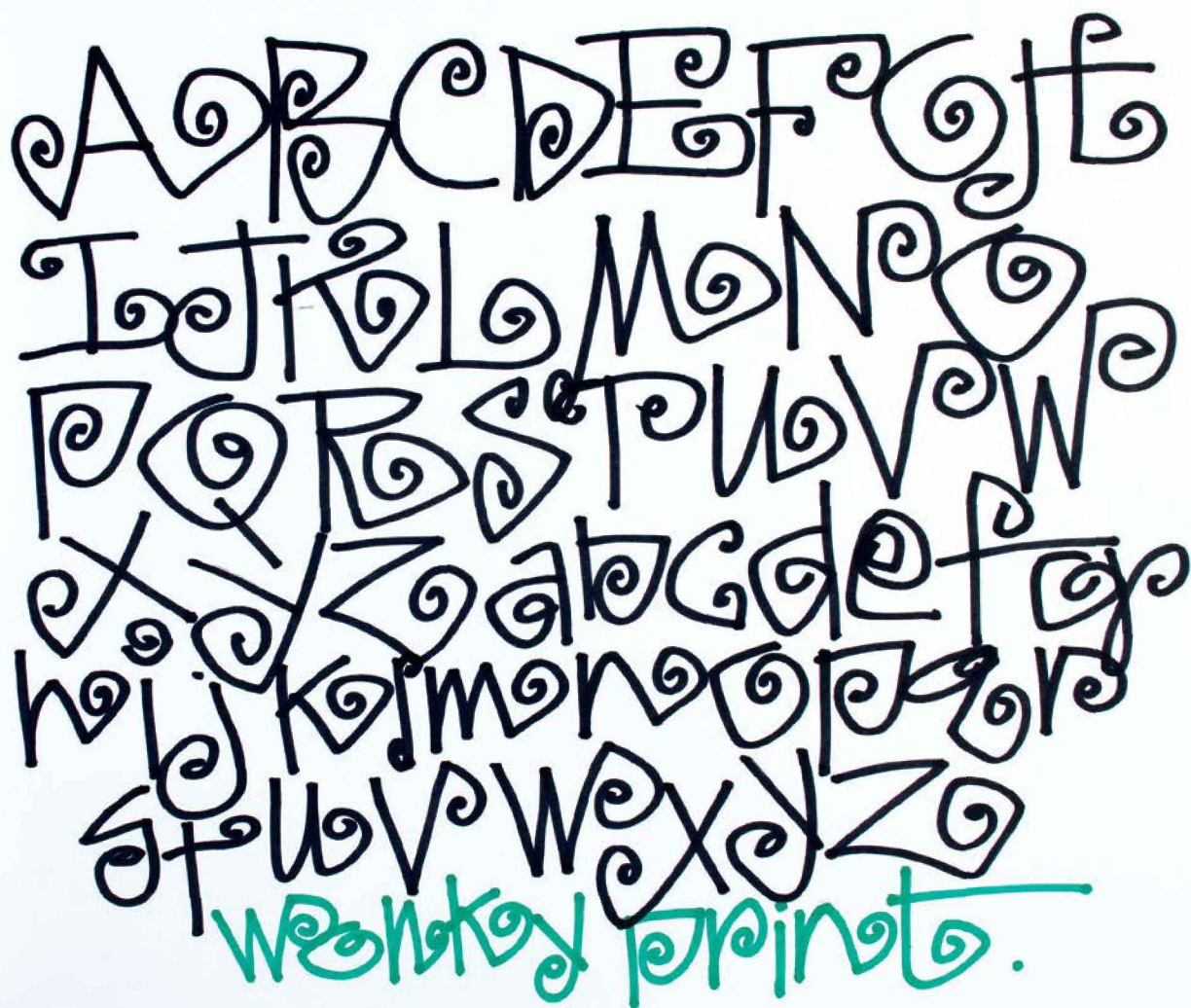

## WONKY PRINTING

Make consistent, irregular curls and swirls extending off each letter, giving it movement and personality.





## BRUSHING UP

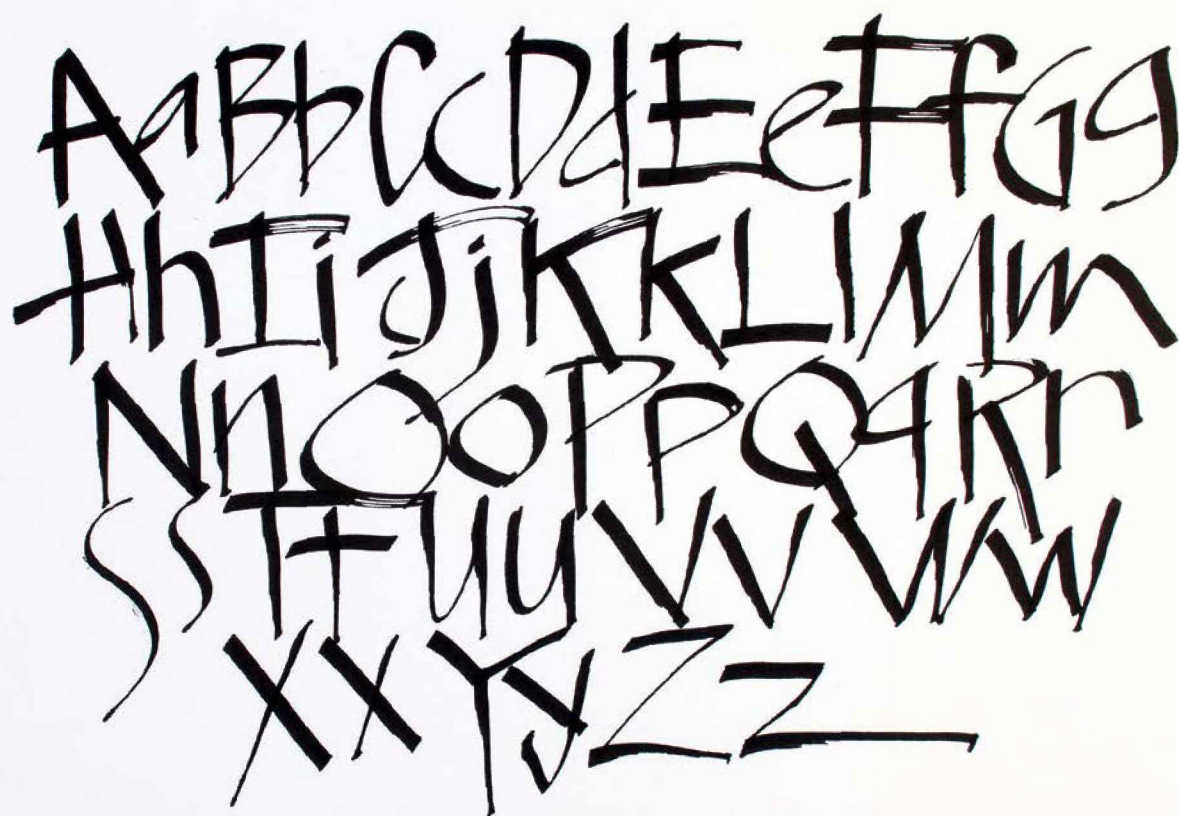
Use assorted paintbrushes (rounds, flats, whatever you have) to letter pages of juicy alphabets with colorful watercolors.





## CALLIGRAPHIC CONCEPTS

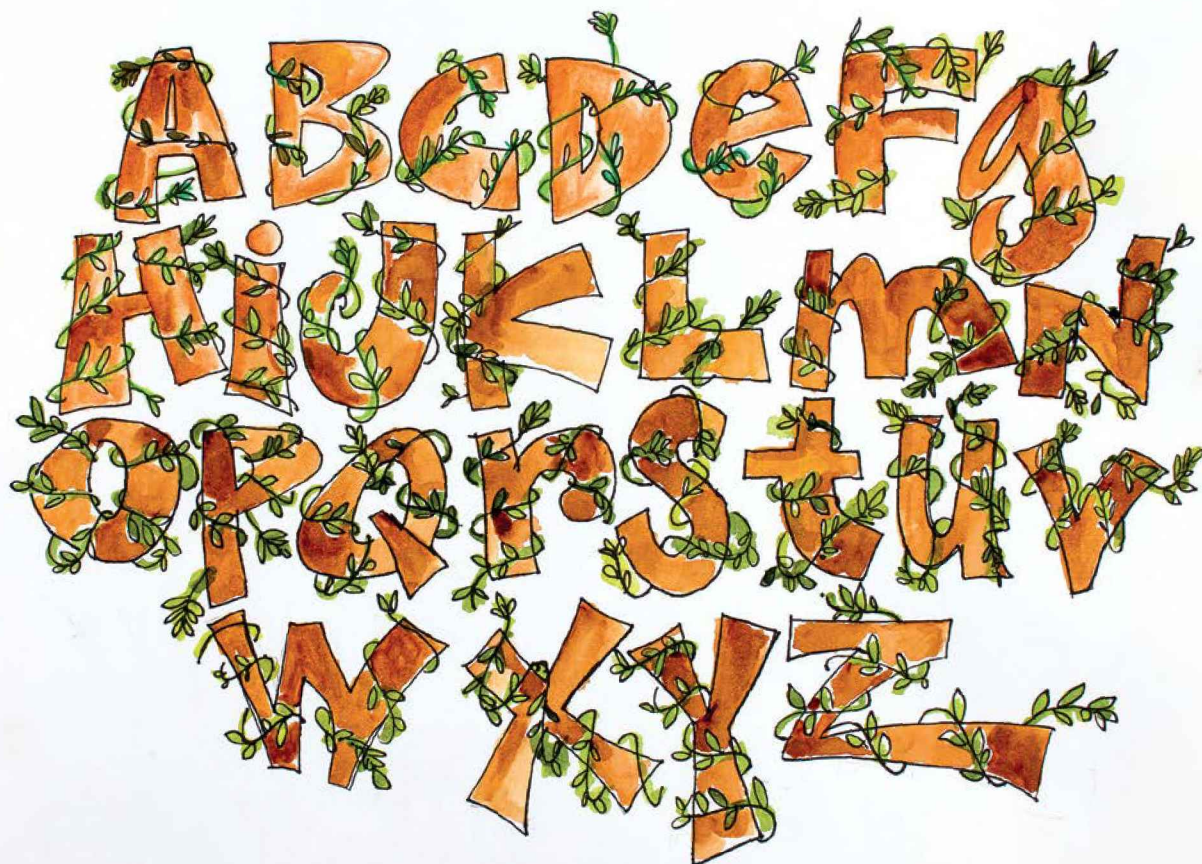
Use a parallel pen to create a freehand italic calligraphy style.





## IT'S A WRAP

Create whimsical block letters by wrapping a colorful leafy vine around the letterform.





## DOODLE DECORATE

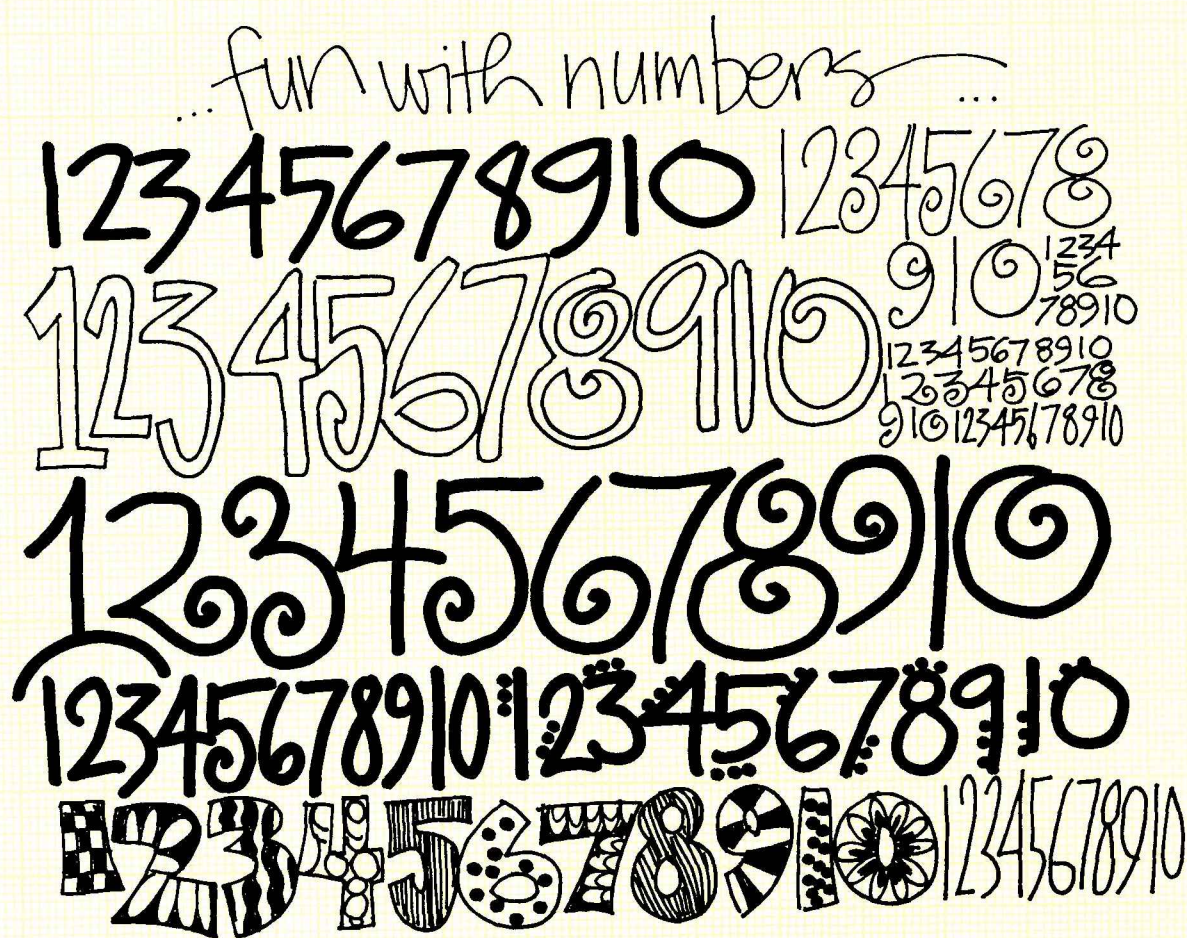
Doodle patterns and designs inside block letterforms. Make each letter in the alphabet contain the same decoration or letter each alphabet with mix-and-match patterns to create interest.





## WHAT'S YOUR NUMBER?

You can use the same ideas and style techniques you use in designing letters and whole alphabets to create interesting numbers with an artistic flair. Here are just a few examples to get you started.





## POSITIVE NEGATIVES

Be inventive and fill the negative space in and around the letters with casual block shapes and bright color. Watch the letters pop off the page!





## DISTRESS ALPHA

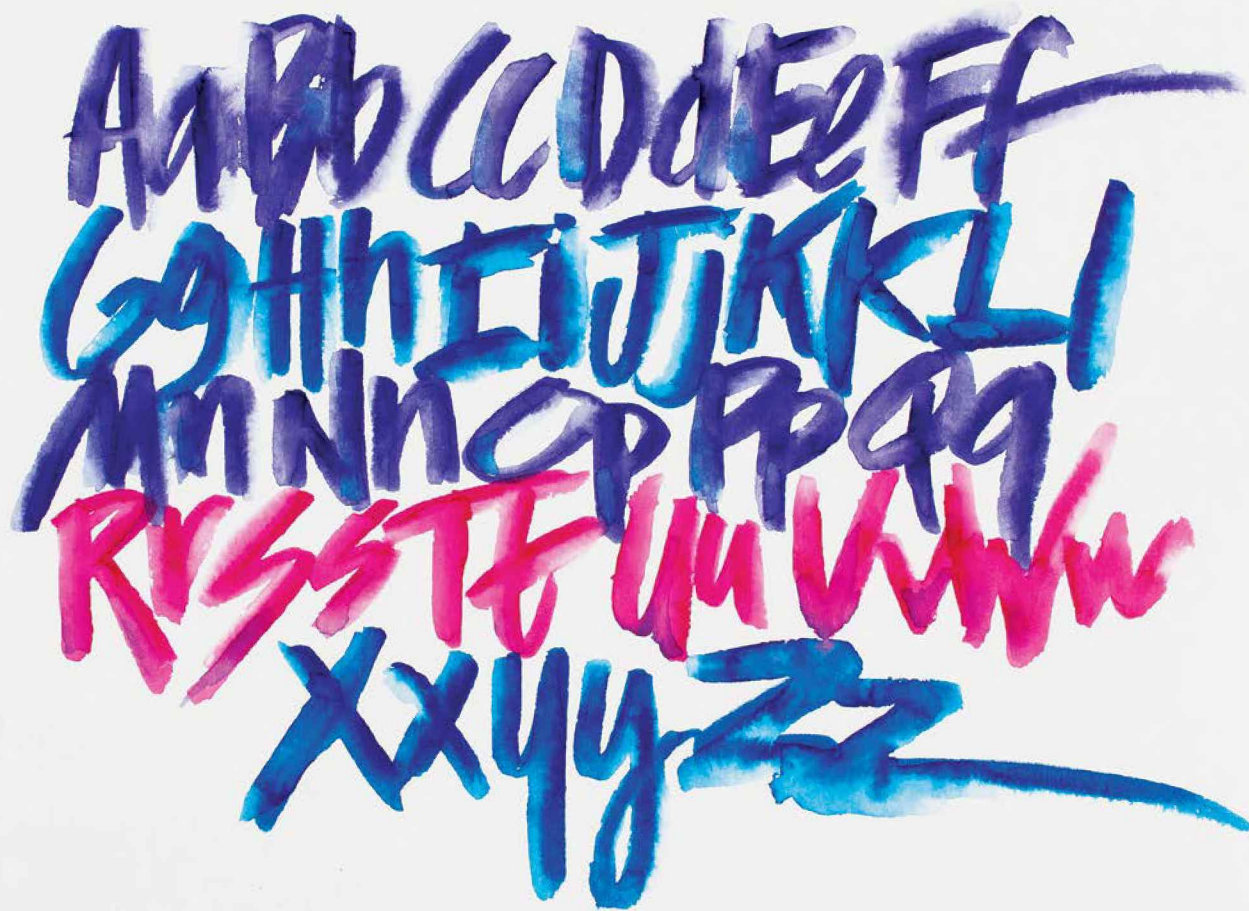
Practice pages of alphabets with India or acrylic ink on a dry brush. Use an old brush (one that has seen better days!), ideally with separating bristles, to produce sketchy, distressed-looking lines.





## WATER MARKS

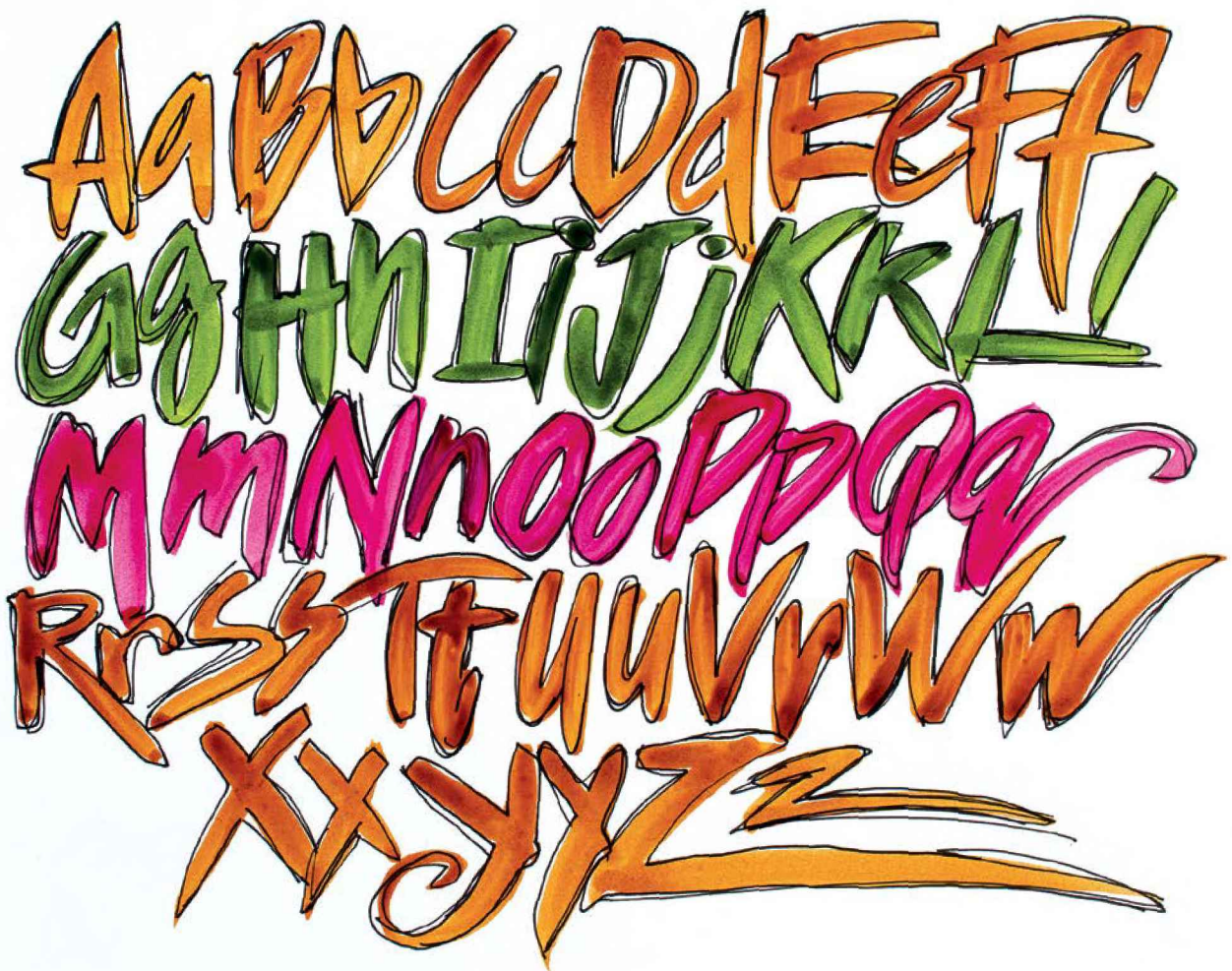
Letter an alphabet with a dye-based marker that is not waterproof. My favorite marker for this is the dual brush marker by Tombow. With a water brush, trace over the edges of each letter until the color "bleeds" out, creating a light watercolor wash.





## SCRUFF AND SKETCH

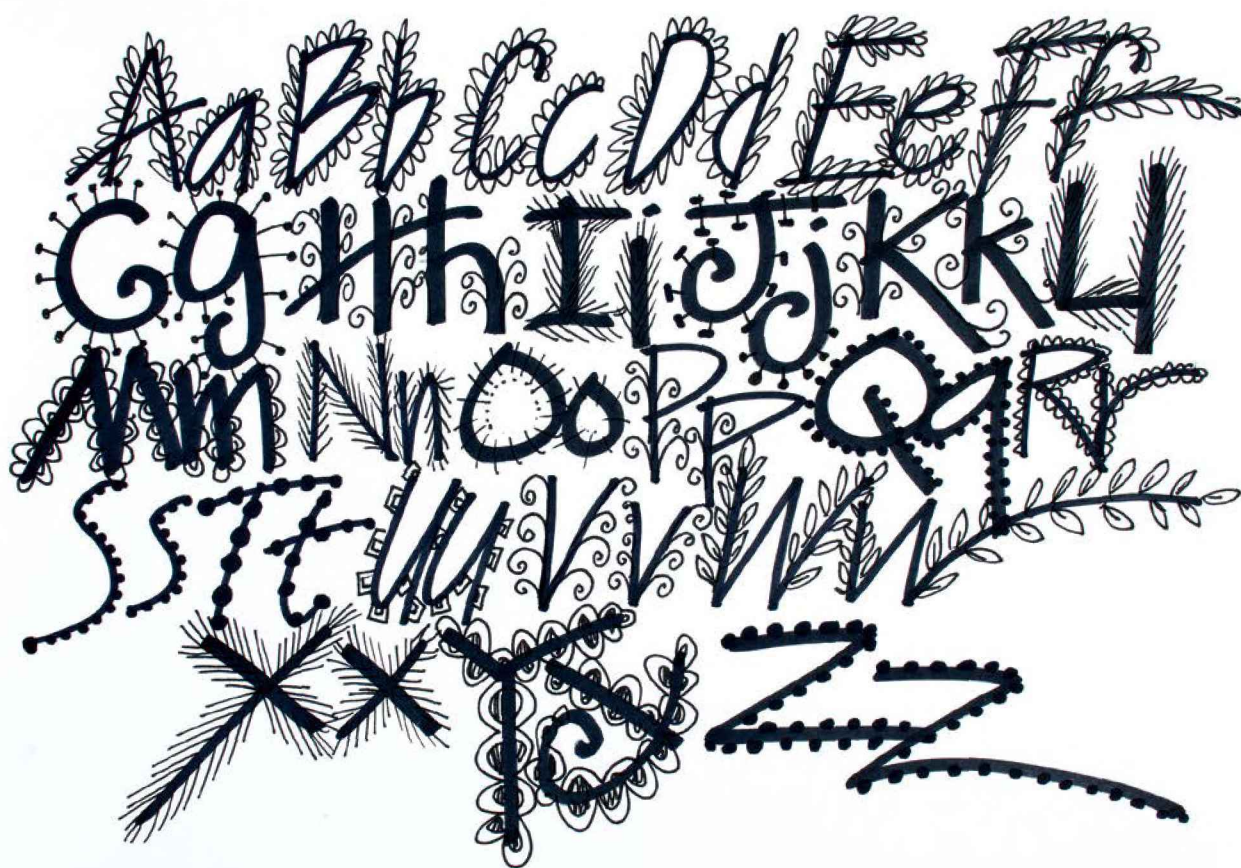
Paint an alphabet with watercolor and a scruffy dry brush and let it dry. With a black permanent pen, draw, trace, and loosely sketch around the letters, accentuating the interesting shapes formed by the brush marks.





## PRETTY EDGY

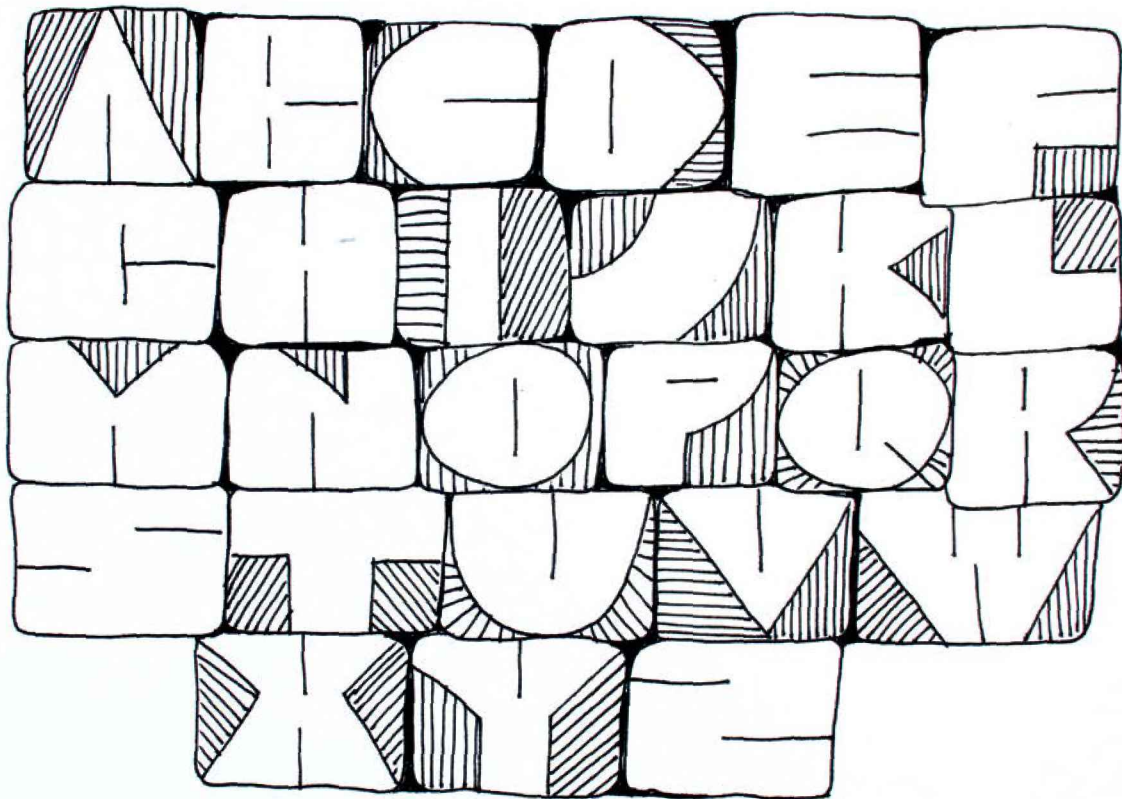
Create artful, interesting letters by doodling and drawing whimsical decorations and patterns, exaggerating the outline edges of letters.





## MODERN ART MINIMAL

Form each letter of the alphabet with the most minimal lines in a box shape. Add lines and colored shapes for interest to make the letters pop. Each letter looks like an abstract art piece but still maintains its clear identity.





## INK BLOTS

Letter an entire alphabet with a pipette or the dropper that comes inside a bottle of acrylic or India ink

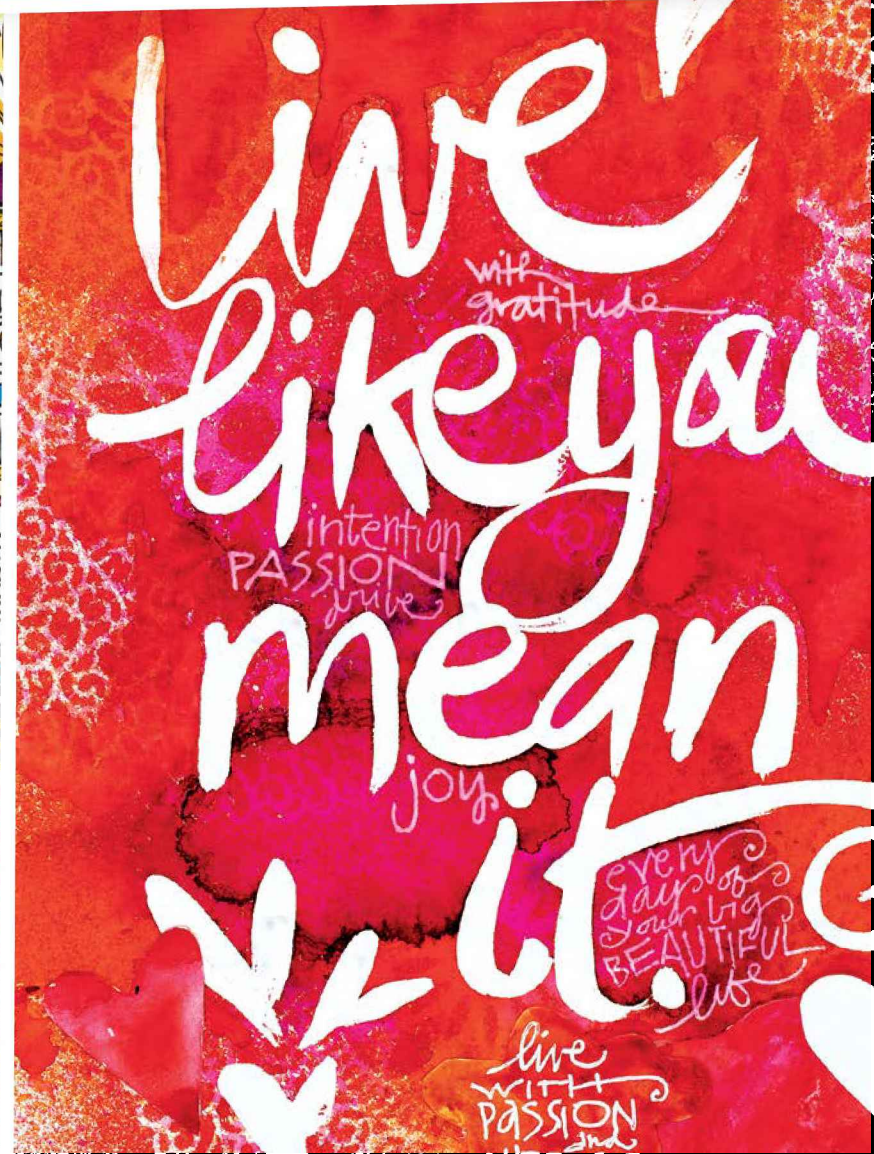

# Art and Letters

In this chapter, you'll see lots of samples of my artwork that incorporate whimsical lettering. They illustrate how I implement the techniques discussed in the book into my own personal artwork, whether in my journals or on other surfaces, such as canvas and fabric. I hope you're inspired to try the same techniques in your own creative endeavors!



# FROM JOURNAL TO FINISHED ART

I devoted an entire earlier chapter to journals (see *The Letter Love Inspiration Journal* on page 20), so you know by now that working in journals is my preference when making art daily.

If you were to view my entire artwork portfolio, you'd see that most of my current art and lettering work is done in assorted art journals and bound books. I love the freedom of making page after page of artwork on the crisp, clean, untouched pages

of a new journal, with no other intention than to make art. Practicing and experimenting with no particular reason inspires me to play, leading me to significant discoveries and directions for my art. I develop new letters, plan new compositions,





and make mistakes. I can always tear out the page if I really don't like something that's not adding to my creative joy. It's my safe place to learn and use different materials. Using a journal as an art tool also

serves as a personal style reference and can be a catalyst for incorporating specific lettering techniques into journals, wall art, gifts, mixed-media pieces, and more.



*My personal journals are full of colorful experiments with layouts, background treatments, art elements, words, and letterforms.*



## ARTFULLY ABSTRACTED

Practice freeform, organic lettermaking with loose doodle drawing to create an abstracted image. Use fine-tip pens and colored markers to letter, exaggerating shapes and adding decorative lines and patterns.





## WORD STACK

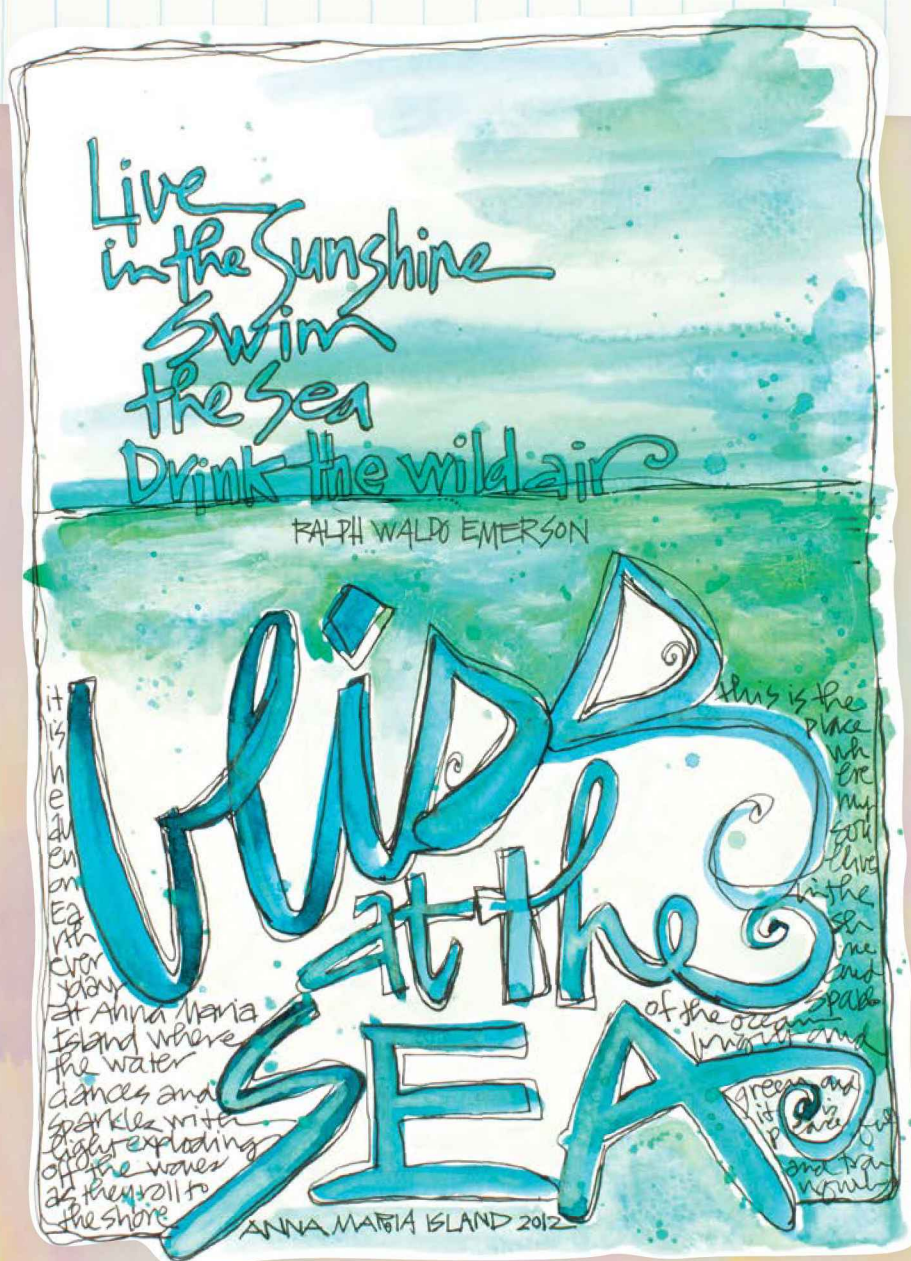
On a colorful mixed-media background, I "stacked" the lettered words to create a strong vertical composition. I also varied the width and height of the words and added patterns over the letters for extra interest.





## WATERCOLOR WHIMSIES

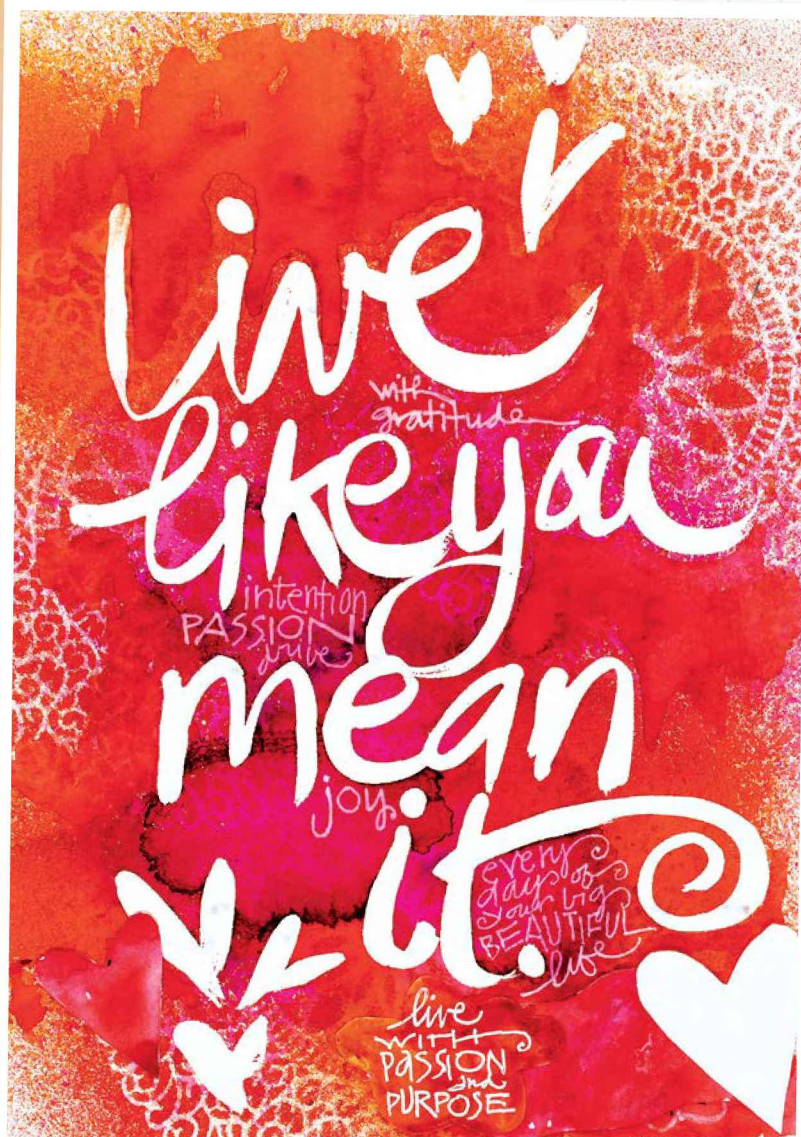
Colorful watercolor and inked backgrounds create a surface for showcasing poetic words.





## FEARLESS FRISKET

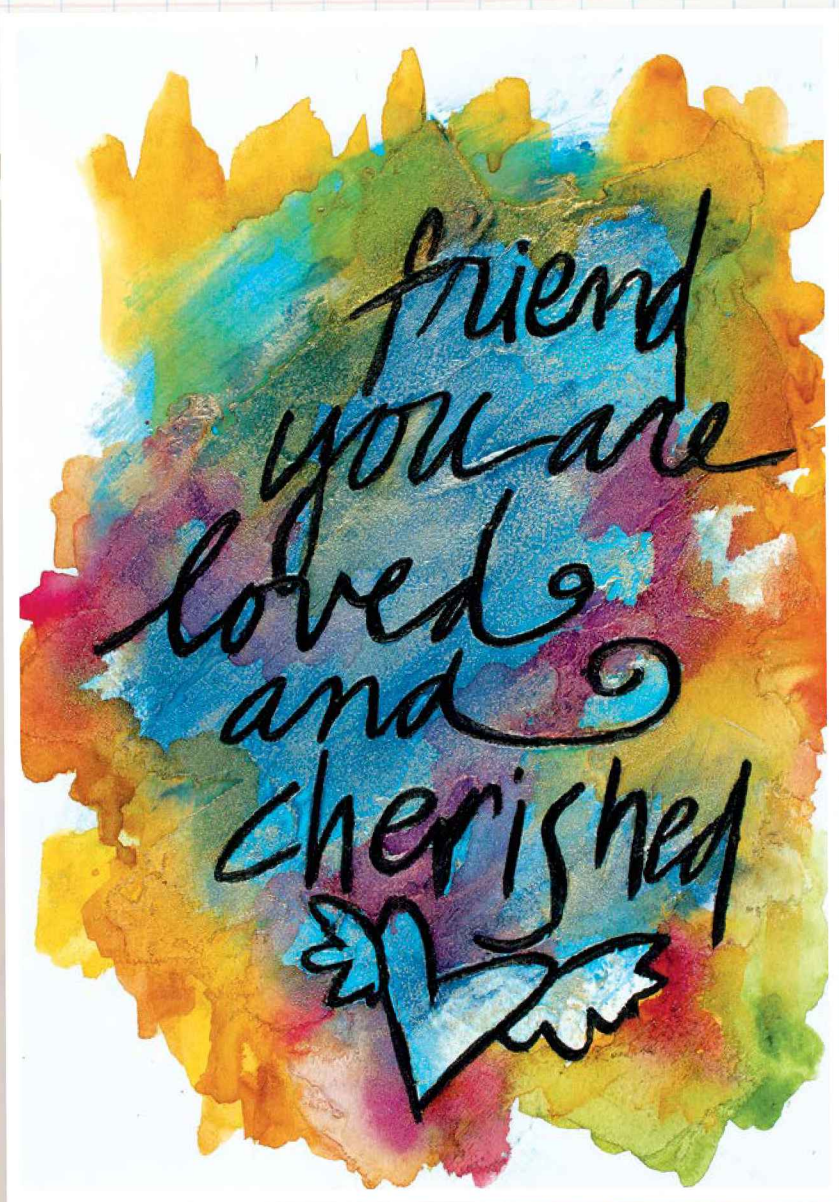
Make your own lettering "masks" with frisket. Frisket is a latex masking fluid used mainly by watercolor artists to block out certain areas in their artwork. For lettering art, use an inexpensive brush with frisket to paint large words and let it dry completely. Add a watercolor wash over the entire surface and let that dry completely. With a soft cloth, gently peel away the frisket to reveal the dramatic lettering under the watercolor. Add journaling with a white pen over the watercolored areas.





## GESSO ETCHING

Apply molding paste or gesso with a palette knife to heavy paper or canvas. Write words with the pointed end of a paintbrush and then accentuate the letters with black. Add color to the background with watercolor or acrylic paint.





## MARKER MASTERPIECE

Use a Tombow water-soluble marker to doodle an illustration on water-color paper. Letter a quote with a black pen so the words stand out in the colorful composition.





## FABRIC AND FONTS

Paint muslin fabric with acrylic paints and letter a message with assorted permanent pens. I added machine stitching around this piece to frame it.





## LETTER AND STITCH

Write a verse in pencil or a fine-tip Pitt pen on muslin fabric. Hand-stitch over the written message with colorful embroidery threads.





## LITTLE ACCORDION BOOK

For a fun alternative to a journal, keep a collection of small written words and phrases in an accordion-style book.





Remember making a paper fan out of looseleaf paper back in grade school? The same concept is used for making an accordion-style art journal. Cut watercolor or Bristol paper into strips at least 3" to 8" (7.5 to 20.5 cm) by 12" to 20" (30.5 to

51 cm). Any size strips will work, but you want to have large-enough pages to paint and letter. Fold the paper in half and then fold the sections back and forth using the paper-fan technique. Paint and letter each individual page on both sides.





## TEENY TEXT

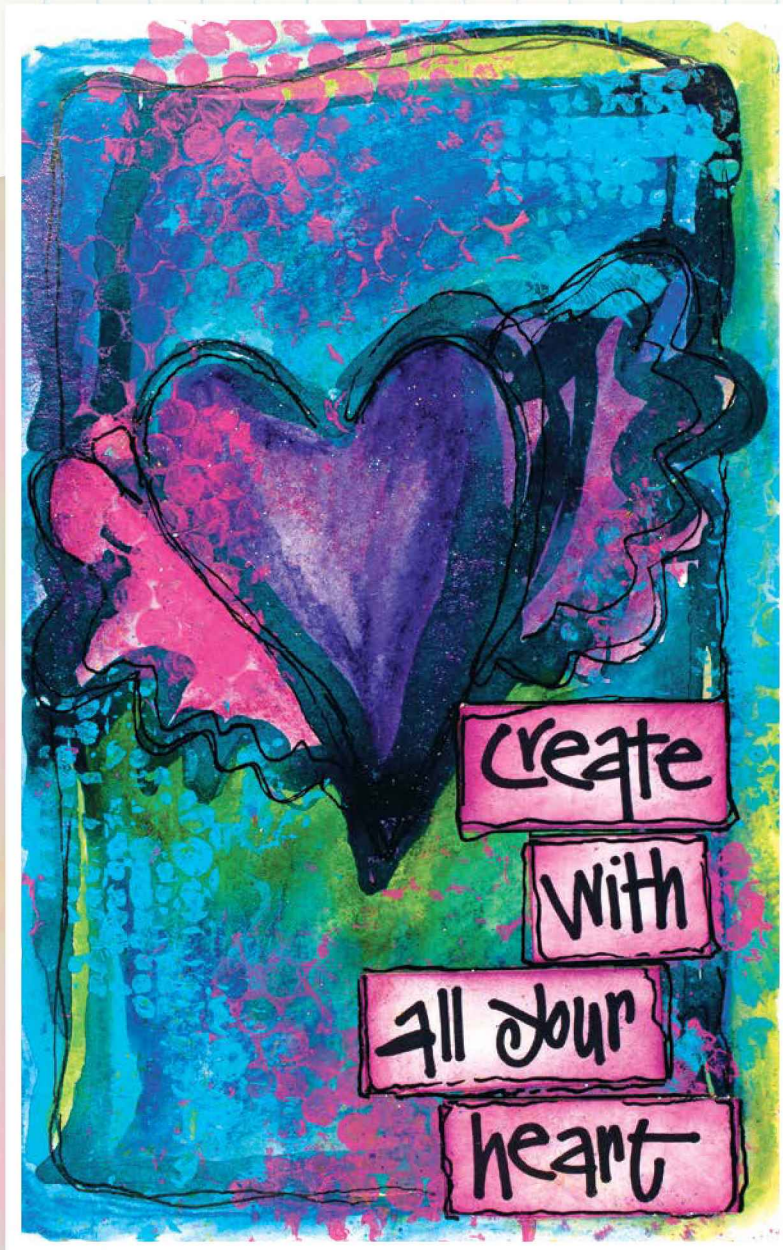
Write one large word and then fill in the interesting spaces around it with tiny lettering.





## ARTFUL COLLAGE

Color assorted papers with spray inks, then tear them into strips. Add favorite words and phrases on the papers and paste them on journal pages, textured cardboard, or any heavy paper background.





## CANVAS ART

Paint a canvas with acrylic paint and add lettering with permanent pens or acrylic paint markers.





## TISSUE-PAPER TEXT

If you panic at the thought of adding hand lettering on your beautiful artwork, try my tissue-paper trick

Write out your words or phrases several times on white tissue paper (plain gift-wrap brands are fine) using waterproof pens or acrylic ink until you are satisfied with the lettering. Cut out around the letters in a freeform shape, and attach them to your artwork with a “gel medium

sandwich.” Apply a thin coat of gel medium to your artwork, place the tissue on that layer, then add another thin coat of gel medium on top of the tissue. Gel medium will dry clean and clear and blend into the artwork underneath.





## COLOR BOOKS

Construct homemade journals with colorful painted and stenciled art papers. Fold the pages into a book and add your handwritten thoughts and inspirations. Use broad-tip markers for lettering over busy patterns.



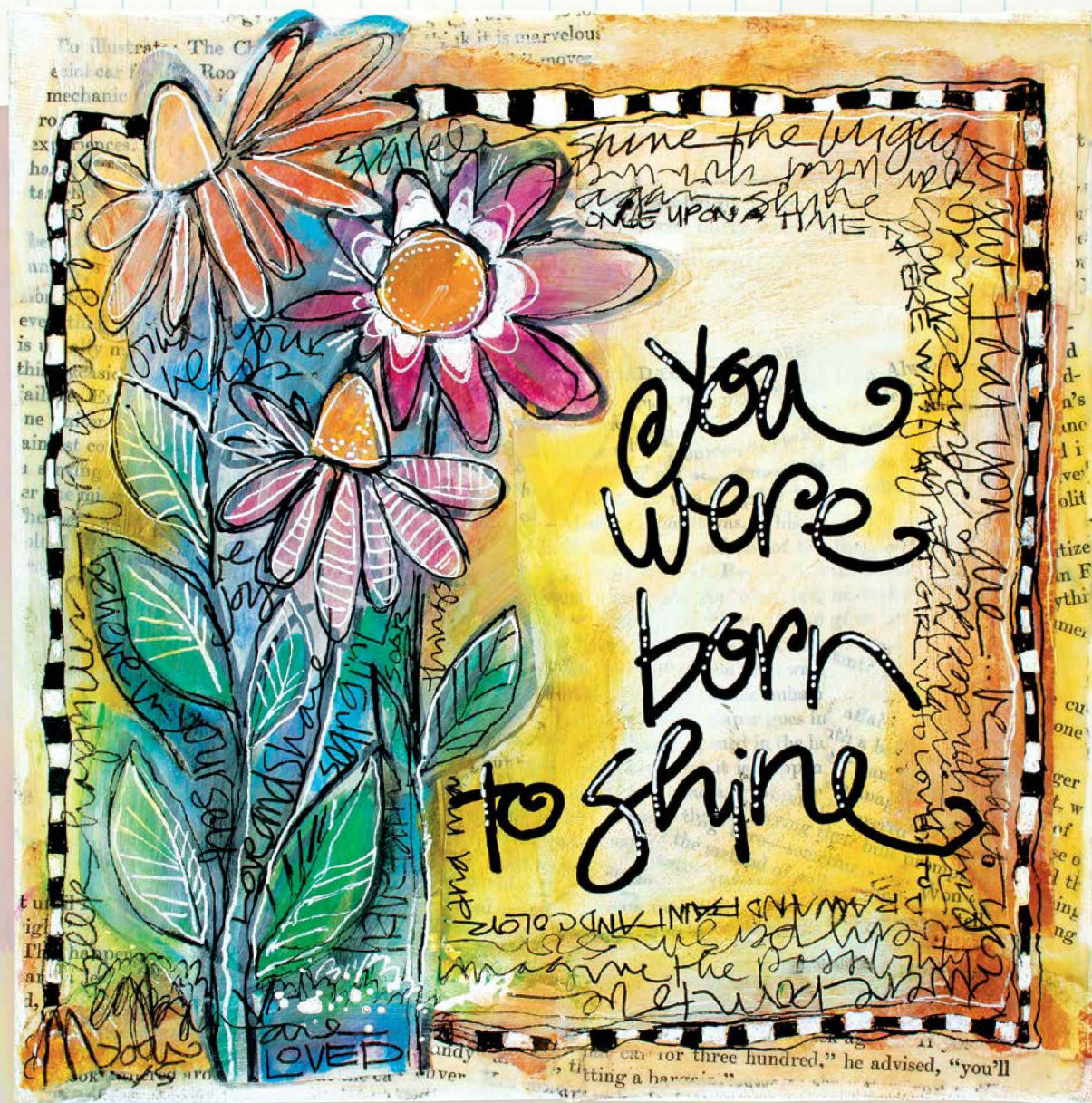






## ARTFUL WORD PLAY

Illustrate words in assorted font sizes and colors. Use continuous free-flowing handwriting as a border or background filler pattern.





## DOODLE-LETTER COLOR POP

Doodle words in black and white. Fill in the negative space around the phrase with bright watercolors, frame it with a loose line, and use writing as a border element.





# BEAUTIFUL BACKGROUNDS

One of the most enjoyable practices in mixed-media lettering art is making fun and funky backgrounds for words and quotes on journal pages or other surfaces. Anything goes in creating background art! There are countless techniques for making backgrounds to showcase lettering art. Here are just a few examples.





## FREE AND EASY

I often just use freeform, loose watercolor or acrylic paintbrush strokes to cover an entire page.



## TIP

Paint, spray, splatter, doodle, and decorate your pages ahead of time, so backgrounds are ready for lettering when the perfect words and inspiration strike.





## PAINTED MASTERPIECES

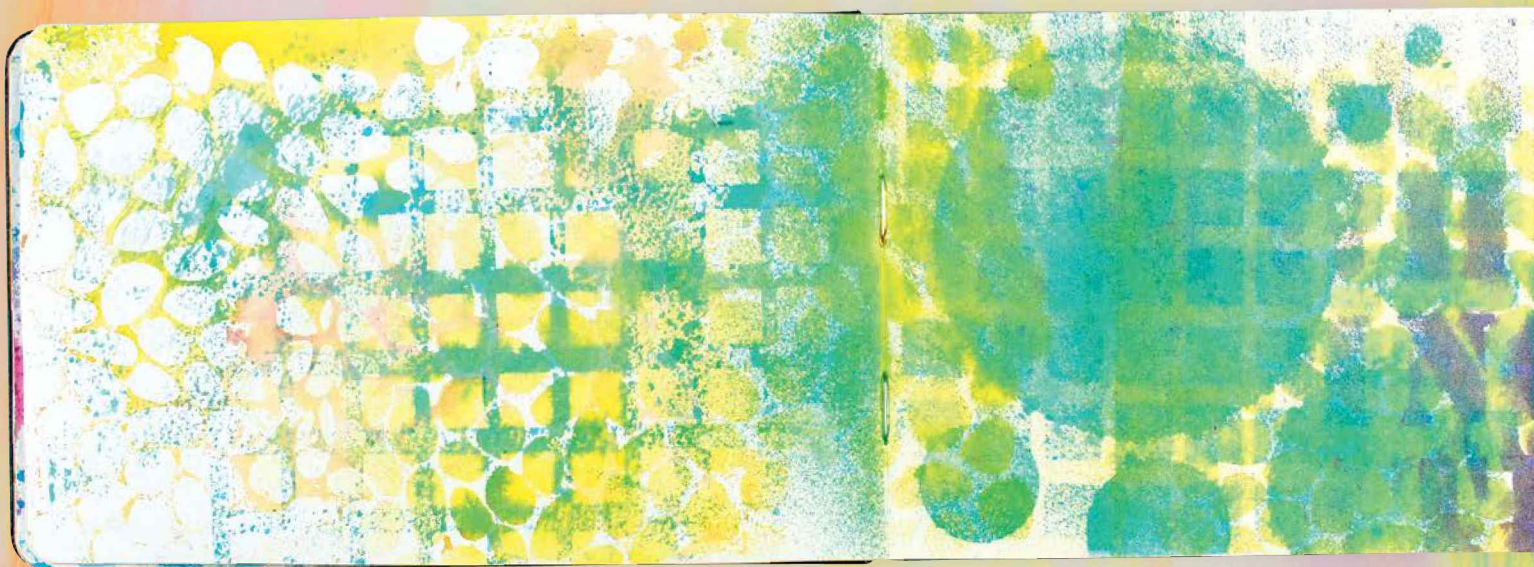
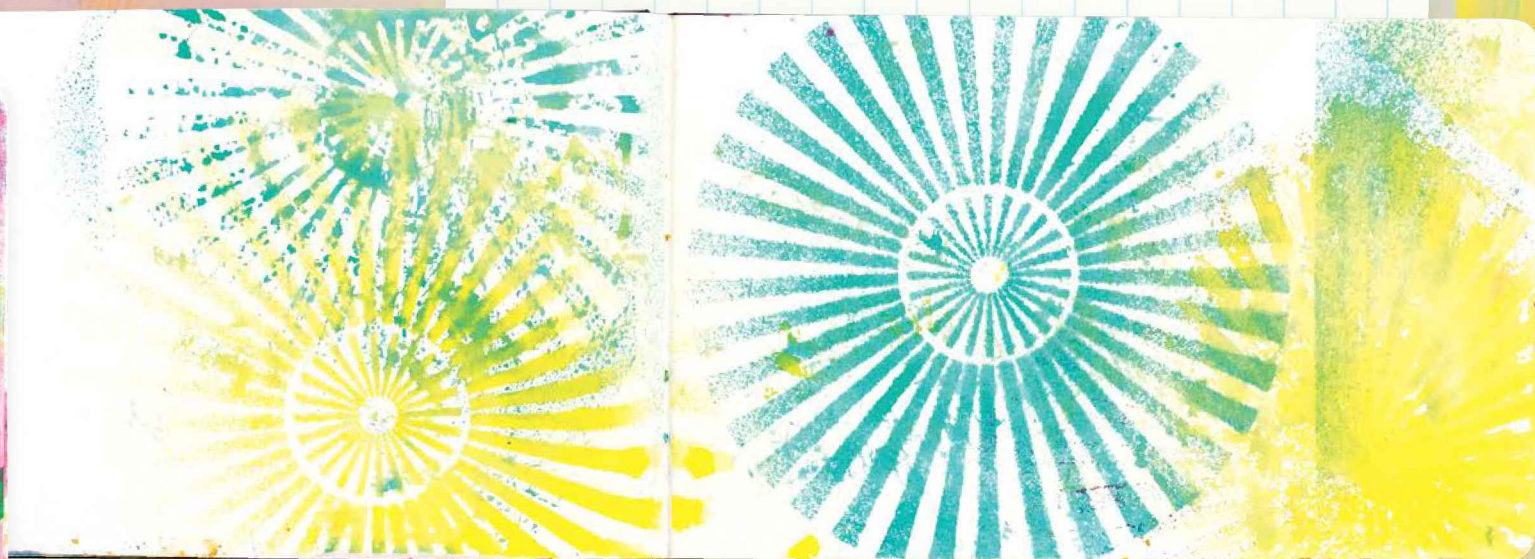
Simple painted lines, patches of layered color, and stenciled shapes make perfect backgrounds for lettering work.



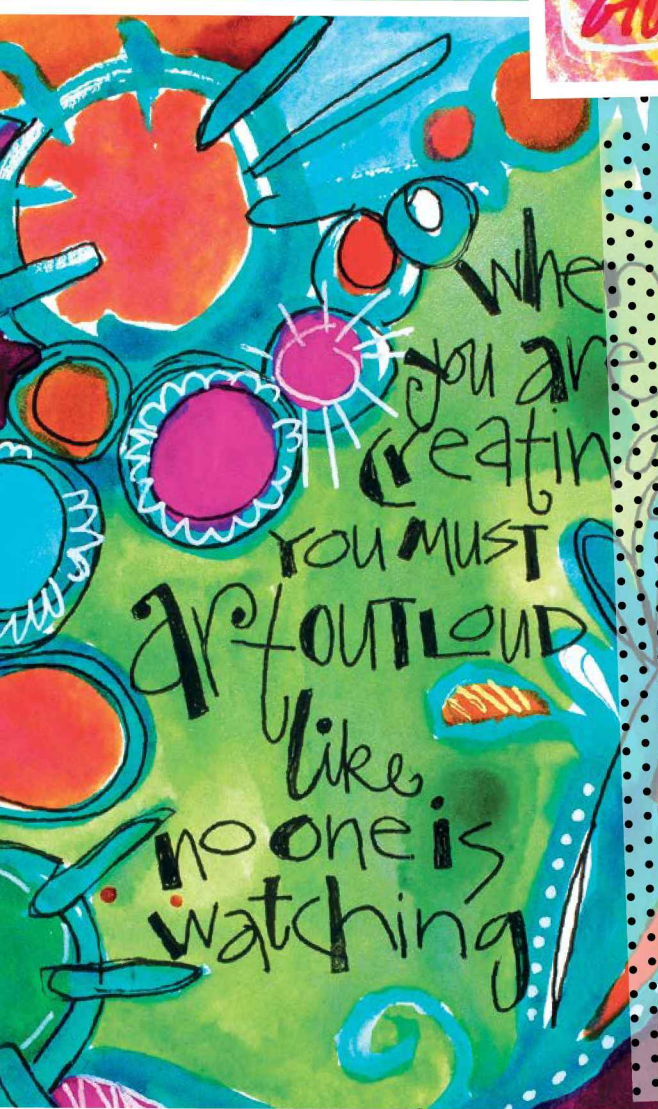


## TEXTURE TIME

Using spray inks and acrylic paint with stencils, stamps, sponges, and bubble wrap adds interesting dimension and depth on a patterned surface.

I'm energized by words with purpose and by making art with meaning behind it, especially if it touches others. 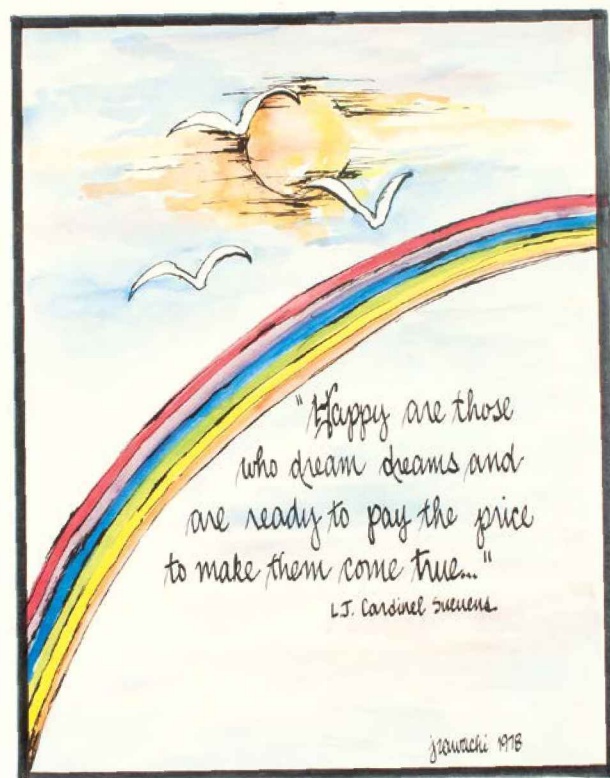
# ART FROM THE HEART

*Two of my most treasured pieces of art are those that I created for my parents when I was still in school.*

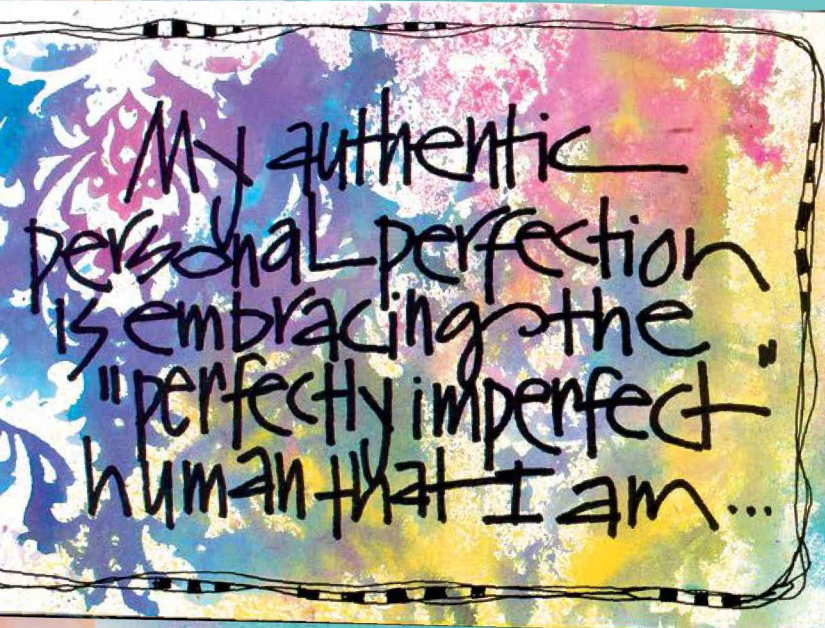
My dad was my biggest cheerleader in life, always encouraging me to be an artist and fly with the wings of talent that I was born with. One of his favorite quotes was, "Happy are those who dream dreams and are ready to pay the price to make them come true." For Father's Day one year, I illustrated that verse for him on a painting. It hung in his office for seventeen years. It's just a simple watercolor with some black ink lettering, but this artwork holds great power over my thoughts and memories, and I see how I have grown up as an artist.

While I'm sharing my early artwork with you, let's embrace the topic of "perfection." Have you ever made a piece of art, completed it, and realized you made a gigantic error? I have: my parent's anniversary gift in 1984. I spent hours painting a perfect watercolor illustration, lettering the words to "Through The Years"

by Kenny Rogers, their favorite song. Perfection I thought! I was so excited to give it to them. That was







until they opened it at a party in front of fifty people. Everyone loved the painting, but then my dad leaned toward me and gingerly whispered, "You forgot a word." WHAT?!!!!!! It was in the *first* line of the fifty hand-lettered lines. I was mortified, but don't think anyone really noticed. This "imperfection" made the most wonderful memory and life lesson for me. I really couldn't "fix" the painting; it was already under glass.

I probably would have made it worse by trying to alter the error anyway.

When I look at this thirty-year-old painting, I see it as a symbol in my own life, knowing that my authentic personal perfection is embracing the "perfectly imperfect" human that I am. And I like it, it's freeing. It's okay to make a mistake, especially when your heart is in the right place.

## TIP

Words inspire much of the art I create. Start a words journal in which you can collect quotes, messages, and words that move you. I have shelves of sketchbooks and journals filled with scribbled quotes and experimental writing styles for future artworks. Cherish these journals as reference tools that will guide you in creating word art or illustrations for personal enjoyment or sharing with others.

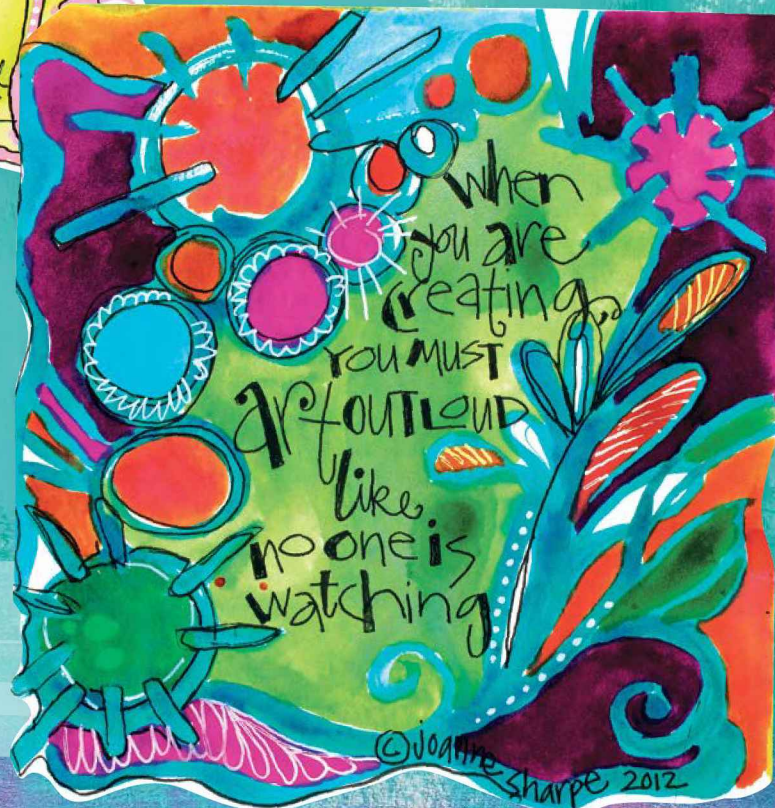
